Rector 's note

Leadership...

PARISH MISSION:

Follow Christ through the way we live and love, spreading the good news of God in Christ, opening our hearts to all, and experience and spread joy in the process. One of the more powerful phrases in Passion narrative that we read on Palm Sunday is also one that most people probably never think about. It is *not* one of the phrases that anyone mentioned when I asked you to "preach the homily" a week and a half ago on Palm Sunday. All of you who spoke that day, and those of you who sent me emails subsequently, offered incredibly insightful comments about the Passion, and what aspects of that narrative spoke specifically to you.



The phrase I am thinking about is what Jesus says to Peter, as Jesus is telling Peter that he will deny (three times) that he even knows Jesus. I'm sure you remember the scene, but here is the exchange to refresh your memory.

Jesus	"Simon, Simon, listen! Satan has demanded to sift all of you like wheat, but I have					
	prayed for you that your own faith may not fail; and you, when once you have turned					
	back, strengthen your brothers."					
Peter	"Lord, I am ready to go with you to prison and to death!"					
Jesus	"I tell you, Peter, the cock will not crow this day, until you have denied three times that					
	you know me." (Luke 22:31-34)					

And so Peter does! But, the phrase is there in that enigmatic comment by Jesus that starts this dialog. "I have prayed...that your own faith may not fail; and you, *when once you have turned back, strengthen your brothers.*" How very interesting. The failing of Peter to acknowledge his discipleship and love for Christ in the moment of his testing (outside Chief Priest's house) is not his ultimate undoing, nor a sign that Peter is faithless. But it does prove that he is human.

Further, it seems that this is a necessary step for Peter. It is easy to be brave and boastful, "I am ready to go with you to prison and to death!" when we don't believe that our words are going to be tried. But there is something about being tested, and having to come to terms with our own human frailty and fear that is required if one really is to be a good leader. Peter can only turn back, and strengthen others after he has known that disappointment, that humility.

It is only then that he can get up, dust himself off, and try again, now wiser from the experience. The Peter we find after the Resurrection to be less boastful, but ironically more confident, more sure of his loyalty to Christ, come what may (read first few chapters of the book of Acts and you'll see what I mean). He is probably a lot more understanding of the failings of others, as any good leader should be. Able to encourage them when they need it, but also recognizing that they may have to learn from a fall.

Not surprisingly, the above passage happens to follow a whole paragraph in which Jesus is speaking to his disciples about leadership. Surely, he is preparing them for their leadership of the Jesus movement, knowing this is his Last Supper with them. He knows their tendency to argue with one another as to which is the greatest. Such struggles for earthly power and boastfulness are not Jesus' way, and would have been as uninspiring for Jesus early followers as they can be for us today.

When even at this Last Supper with their Lord, an argument arises as to which of them is to be regarded as the greatest, Jesus simply says "the greatest among you must become like the youngest, and the leader like one who serves" (Luke 22:26). And so Jesus gives us a model of servant leadership which to this very day *Continued on next page*

could a great deal to improve the way the world works, and is still to be considered the model of leadership for the Church.

We will hear a great deal during the Easter season for Part II of Luke's Gospel, the Book of Acts. This is the account of how the Apostles regrouped after Jesus' Resurrection and Ascension. It tells us about how the Church grew in virtually every place that these apostles went. Some have called it the Gospel of the Church, or more accurately, the Gospel of the Holy Spirit. That Spirit is what brings unity to the Church, and real power. It binds us to Christ. It binds us to one another.

The early Church learned to find unity, even in the midst of their growing diversity. Many became attracted to the Church and were inspired by the Spirit of love that pervaded that community. Many came to believe in Jesus as Messiah and Lord. As for the leaders, especially Peter, they learned that they could not be their own saviors, that there is but one in whom they could be their trust, and he would give them what they needed when they needed it. His strength would be enough, theirs would not be.

Revealed in these texts is the apostles' realization that they were in need of Christ, and his life-giving Spirit, but that they were in need of one another. The humility required for such a realization can come from lots of experiences, some more profound than others. In Peter's case, when Christ' gaze catches his eyes after his third denial, must have been that moment. But listen in the weeks ahead for how that experience shaped and informs his leadership among the apostles going forward.


I'll be missing you all deeply, during my sabbatical, as you contemplate these and so many other things over the next three months. What a time for Resurrection! Know that you are in my prayers, and please keep me in yours. As a wise person once said, "let us meet there, in our prayers." Know too that I'll be thinking on these texts as I journey. I depart just for this short time, and then I assure you of my return on July 1st, when we will have stories to share with each other of our adventures.

I go on this Spiritual pilgrimage confident of your deep love for Christ and one another. You will be making some important decisions about our future together while I'm away. Not the least of which is whether we will have a preschool here at St. Clement's. I know that you will pray and discern God's purposes in this and all situations for our beloved church, and that you will have the courage to follow wherever you believe God would have us go together.


