Minutes from the Annual Parish Meeting for the Year 2004 75th Annual Meeting – January 23, 2005

Opening Prayer & Call to Order: The Rev. Packard Okie opened the 75th Annual Meeting with a prayer. The Rev. Cn. Diane Jardine Bruce called the meeting to order.

Attendance Lists: An attendance sheet was circulated. Diane requested that those present be sure to sign the attendance record.

Appointments by the Rector: The following appointments were made:

Clerk of the Annual Meeting – Betty Comer Parliamentarian – Bob Morris Tellers – Julie Morris and Frank Mansfield

Approval of the Minutes of the 2003 Annual Meeting: A MOTION was made by Jon Sherman, seconded by Katrina Soto and CARRIED that the minutes of the 2003 Annual Meeting be approved as submitted.

Reading of the Qualifications of Voters: Diane read aloud the following qualifications (Canon 20, Section 1 and 2, page C-39) for those wishing to vote in today's election:

Must be Baptized Faithful in corporate worship Received Holy Communion at least three times during the preceding 12 months 16 years of age or older Giver of record to support the Church with money or personal service

Elections

Vestry: Sr. Warden, Sue King presented the following slate for election to the Vestry (terms would expire in 2008): **Russ Inglish, Stephen James** (filled the remainder of Don Crowe's term which entitled Stephen to run for a three year term), **Venice Peek & Francisca Rojas** (filled the remainder of Matthew Adamson's term which entitled her to run for a three year term). Hearing no nominations from the floor, a MOTION was made by Pat Welliver, seconded by Bob Morris and CARRIED that the nominations be closed and the slate as presented be declared elected by acclamation.

Appointment of the Sr. Warden: The Rev. Cn. Diane Jardine Bruce announced the appointment of *Jon Sherman* as Sr. Warden. The Sr. Warden or "Rector's Warden" is appointed by the Rector. The Jr. Warden or "Peoples' Warden" will be elected by the Vestry at the Vestry Retreat.

Diocesan Convention Delegates: The Sr. Warden (Jon Sherman) and the Jr. Warden (elected at Vestry Retreat) are automatically convention delegates. The names of Wendy Lords and Katrina Soto were submitted for election as convention delegates. Hearing no nominations from the floor, a MOTION was made by Bob Morris, seconded by Joan Marahrens an CARRIED that the nominees as presented be elected by acclamation.

Alternate Delegates to Diocesan Convention: The name of *Frank Soto* was submitted for convention alternate. *Melissa James* consented to have her name considered to be an alternate delegate. Hearing no further nominations from the floor, a MOTION was made by Bob Morris, seconded by Jon Sherman and CARRIED that the nominations be closed and the nominees as presented be elected by acclamation.

Deanery Representative: The name of **Todd Muffatti** was submitted for nomination as Deanery Representative. Hearing no further nominations from the floor, a MOTION was made by Jon Sherman, seconded by Tina Inglish and CARRIED that the nominations be closed and Todd Muffatti be elected by acclamation.

Annual Reports: A MOTION was made by Tina Inglish, seconded by Stephen James and CARRIED that the annual reports be accepted with thanks as presented.

Rector's Report: Diane began by thanking Sue King and Lanneau Miller for their outstanding support and dedicated service on the Vestry and presented each of them with an Alpha & Omega Cross from Germany.

A. Natural Church Development: Diane stated that she, Jon Sherman, Duke Welliver and Karen Williams worked on Natural Church Development which is a program designed to help churches grow. There are eight characteristics of growing churches: *Empowering Leadership, Gift-oriented Ministry, Passionate Spirituality, Functional Structures, Inspiring Worship, Holistic Small Groups, Need-oriented Evangelism and Loving Relationships.* 30 parishioners were selected, according to the National Church Development guidelines, to participate in a survey. The results that were analyzed by Natural Church Development found St. Clement's to be a very healrthy parish. Our lowest score was in Passionate Spirituality. Researchers at NCD found that the important thing is not the way spirituality is expressed but the fact that faith is actually lived out with commitment, fire and enthusiasm. The results of the input are being evaluated and input from as many parishioners as possible will be sought.

B. Some of the accomplishments in 2004 include the following:

• "Operation Spread the Love" began the year with the collection of 50 boxes of toys to send to the Marines to distribute to the children in Iraq.

• We hosted "Late Nite Catechism" with almost 200 people attending and raising funds for our 75th Anniversary celebration.

• We purchased the 75th Anniversary plaque displayed at the front entrance to the church. Diane stated that her father will underwrite the purchase of the remainder of the plaques (parish hall, church office, etc.)

• We continued to celebrate wonderful liturgies throughout the year.

• Bishop Bruno was with us to celebrate our 75th Anniversary.

• Frances Bennett and Dr. John Ballerino put on a wonderful concert which raised \$1,000 for the Friends of Music.

• Dr. John Ballerino left us this fall after his accident. Dan Resch stepped in as interim Organist/Choir Director and saw us through Christmas.

• We have "terminated the termites" with repairs ongoing. Repair of the roof will be accomplished in early 2005.

• We participated in the Habitat for Humanity project of building a house in Orange County.

• We also supported Mary Erickson Community Housing, Family Assistance Ministries and Laura's House with our time, talent and treasure.

• As part of St. Clement's Day ingathering, we were able to send \$1,200 to St. Martin-in-the-Fields in Twentynine Palms to start their Sunday school.

• We put on a great prime rib dinner/silent auction with music from the bell choir and great fellowship.

• We spent over \$6,000 in outreach monies, providing aid and support to people in Orange County, especially in San Clemente.

• We paid our full Mission Share (12%) to the Diocese.

C. *Discretionary Fund Report:* Diane stated that the Discretionary account is used be she and Fr. Okie to help only people in need. At the end of 2003, the Discretionary account was "in the hole" by more than \$2,500. Some of the families who used these funds in 2003 paid back a great amount in 2004.

In 2004, some outreach funds were used as well as discretionary funds to bring the discretionary account "back into the black." The funds were spent as follows:

The number of pledges in 2004 totaled 147 vs. 142 in 2003. Total amount pledged in 2004 was \$252.515.00 (composed of \$236,335 in regular pledges and \$8,110.00 in prepaid pledges.

Actual 2005 pledges received through January 21st was \$260,000.00 with the total number of pledges received at 139 with an anticipated total number of pledges at 150 when all pledges are received. There are approximately \$13,000.00 in outstanding pledges and should bring the total for 2005 to \$273,991.00. There is \$7,000.00 more anticipated from 22 families who have envelope #'s but historically do not pledge.

Longtime Finance committee member, Bob Morris resigned because he moved to The Covington and the drive to the meeting in San Clemente was too long. Bob was applauded for his many years of service.

Joe thanked Myrna Gray and Frank Mansfield who have devoted many hours to supervising the counting teams.

The Merrill-Lynch account was closed and transferred to the building account for termite repair.

2005 Budget: Diane highlighted some of the line item amounts in the budget. St. Clement's will not be receiving a Latino grant this year. Churches that are receiving grants will be receiving as high as a 60% decrease in funding. The rector has received a \$5,000 raise which will result in slight increases in Social Security and Pension. Fr. Okie, Bonnie Brandon (Parish Administrator) and Debra Root (Sunday School Director) were given small raises. We have met our 12% Mission Share with plans to increase it to 15% in the future. Diane stated that we have been carrying a long-time deficit and that \$5,500 will be applied to reduce it. *This is an accounting procedure only.* A MOTION was made by Bob Morris, seconded by Russ Inglish and CARRIED that the Proposed budget be approved as presented.

Thanksgivings: Diane+ stated she was thankful for the work of Duke Welliver and members of the 75th Anniversary committee for planning a wonderful 75th Anniversary year and to Mark Pocino for his work in planning and executing the termite eradication. She also thanked Francisca Rojas for her dedication to building the youth group and Diane was thankful to her dad for underwriting the cost of the new plaques. She then invited members of the parish to share their thanksgivings. Other thanksgivings included good health, for our rector Diane and Debra, our Sunday School Director and for finally taking care of the termite problem.

Installation of Newly Elected Vestry Members: Parishioners in attendance presented the Sr. Warden Jon Sherman and newlyelected Vestry members Russ Inglish, Stephen James, Venice Peek (in absencia) and Francisa Rojas (in absencia) for admission to the Vestry. Diane asked those parishioners present if the persons presented were prepared by a commitment to Christ as Lord, by regular attendance at worship and by knowledge of their duties to exercise their ministry to the honor of God and the well being of God's Church. Those present responded with we believe they are. The above listed Vestry members were officially installed.

Closing Prayer and Adjournment: Before closing, Diane reminded everyone to be sure to sign the attendance list. She also thanked Pat Welliver and her team for the delicious brunch. Fr. Okie closed the Annual Meeting with a prayer and the meeting was adjourned by Diane.

Rector's Report

I'd like to welcome you to this, my 6th annual meeting with you. It almost doesn't seem possible. On June 1, 2006, I will celebrate my 6th anniversary here with at St. Clement's. Time has flown by. We have done an incredible amount of good work together during the last 5 ¹/₂ years. We have celebrated many beautiful liturgies, welcomed and said goodbye to people, and shared many meals together.

This past year, we've had some wonderful "firsts":

- Welcomed Dan Resch as our permanent Organist/Choirmaster.

Agape Alive St. Clement's Counseling Center

Our brochure reads, "A Center for Hope and Understanding." Agape means God's love in Action. This is an ongoing church and community outreach program. From the feedback we are getting from the clients, they feel this counseling is helping them and giving them new home.

The center functions quietly, as it is confidential and protected from general church affairs. Diane Bruce, Rector and our director oversees the program. She may see some parishioners for counseling but usually refers longer term people to the center. We've had a good year with an average of three people being seen each week. Betty, our beloved church secretary, receives the initial calls and arranges appointments. She also calls clients several days in advance to remind them of their appointments times.

Some clients are from the church but most are young people from the surrounding community who cannot afford counseling. We do not charge for services but request a gift to the church at the end of the therapy. Well timed prayer is part of the counseling. We see them for three to six sessions. Sometimes it is for immediate crisis, sometimes for relationship and life problems. Many of these clients have suffered considerable emotional trauma and it is good to be able to offer them a gift of water in Christ's name.

Buildings and Grounds

There has been a lot of activity around the parish this past year for Buildings and Grounds. We've had several major projects and are most grateful to all who contributed to the funding of those projects. Specifically, the following major projects were completed in 2005:

- Termite work started in 2004 was completed in 2005. This was a major project that had been contemplated over a number of years, and it is now accomplished. Many thanks to the members who contributed to the funding for this important maintenance project. From now on, we will be contracting with Reynold's Termite Control for annual maintenance that will avoid the type of remedial work that was required in 2004.
- Repairs to the tile roof were completed this year thanks to Reverend Diane's neighbor who generously provided the labor required to install the tiles while we only had to pay for the cost of materials.
- We completed revamping/landscaping projects that make our courtyard much more pleasant. We owe thanks to the John Bennett and the service project students from St. Margaret's School.
- Stained glass windows were repaired/refurbished by Judson Studios. We had anticipated only repairing half the widows, but due to the generosity of our members, we were able to repair several additional windows that would have required repairs in the next several years.

The repairs, replacements, maintenance and upgrades to our buildings and grounds we experienced in the recent past will be an ongoing effort for St. Clement's. Contributing factors are the obvious wear and tear to the buildings and grounds, proximity to the ocean, and the age of the buildings. We hope to be able to fund these projects in the future by setting aside or reserving a specified amount annually through our budgeting process. However, if those funds set aside are not sufficient, we may have to come to the members for additional funding.

The major Buildings and Grounds project for 2006 is painting the outside of our buildings to bring our facilities up to acceptable standards. Our buildings are badly in need of painting. We are anticipating this will take place early in 2006. We have completed a grant request to hopefully pay for this needed work. If we cannot get this grant, the Building and Grounds limited funds will need to be utilized to cover these expenses. We may need to seek contributions from members to complete this project.

We continued work on our checklist to be in compliance for our insurance carrier. We are developing a procedures manual to specifically address the periodic (annually, monthly, weekly) requirements to maintain our facilities.

Finally, we anticipate a number of cleanup days in 2006, and I hope that anyone who is even slightly "handy" will come out and give us a hand. We have a lot of fun, and it is always great to have the parish looking beautiful!

Finance/Treasurer's Report

The following is a report of the status of the church finances for the year ending **12/31/05**:

Net difference (Income	minus Expenses):	\$	14,937.40



The key components which account for the net increase over expenses were **\$9,967.57** in Current Pledges and **\$5,464.07** in Plate Offerings.

The balance in our Smith-Barney account is **\$1,051.05** as of 12/31/05.

The Diocesan Investment Trust account as of 12/31/05 was **\$81,714.34**.

The actual pledges received to date total **118** with a total value of **\$272,568.00** verses **\$250,000.00** at this time last year. We are anticipating an additional 10 pledges which should bring the total to approximately **\$283,000** and after factoring in a **4% fallout rate** the net should be **\$266,000.00** with a budget set at **\$261,149.00**. We also have 22 families who have envelopes but have historically not pledged. Their annual giving runs around **\$9,500.00**.

I would like to personally thank the people that make this job such a pleasure for me and the members of the Finance Committee:

- (1) The members of St. Clement's who faithfully meet and/or exceed their pledges year after year,
- (2) The counting teams who toil every Monday to supply me and Cindi (our bookkeeper) with the weekly pledge amounts by envelope number and type,
- (3) The Finance Committee (Mark Pocino, Stephen James, and Russ Inglish),
- (4) And certainly last but not least, our fearless and tireless leader Diane who makes it happen each year and monitors each and every dollar spent to insure we get the most bang for the buck.

In conclusion, I look forward to making it all happen again in 2006 as I reach a milestone of 10 years as your Treasurer here at St. Clement's.




