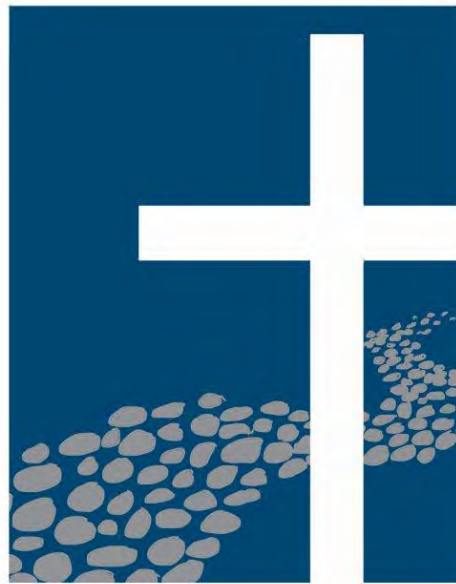

A motion to approve minutes of the 2012 annual meeting was made by Joe Wharton, Tina Inglish second, no discussion, carried unanimously.

Rectors Report:

Fr. Patrick highlighted areas from his written report including what a productive year it had been for music in the parish. Several concerts, a new piano was purchased with funds from the fundraising efforts of the community. Dan Resch called to another parish, a new music director to be named soon. Fr. Patrick acknowledged the dedicated work of the Music Director Search Committee members.

Mother Shireen Baker was called as assistant rector, allowing for a great many more opportunities for outreach and evangelism. Much more is planned for 2014, including reviving the Saints and Sinners events, movie nights with our youth, etc.

Financial standing of the parish and stewardship are on the upswing. There were large outlays from the maintenance reserve in 2013 to replace dangerous heaters, uplifted sidewalks. These funds will need replacing in the near future.

Fr. Patrick announced our Parish Administrator Chandra will be leaving in April. The congregation thanked Chandra for her loving service these past 6 years.

Fellowship: Geri Knapp thanked for organizing the lunch for the annual meeting and also the German traditional dinner for Christmas, Señor Tomas Jimenez-Martinez for the feast of the Virgin of Guadeloupe, Gwendolyn Wilson for her many contributions.

Steve James awarded Star of St. Clement's for his service to our community.

Rector

My beloved in Christ, we have enjoyed another amazing year at St. Clement's by-the-Sea. It was also a year a big transitions, as we brought on a new music director and a new parish administrator. Yet, amidst the inevitable ups and downs of parish life, we seem to have kept an even keel, and sailed steadily forward.

Thankfully, we had no major building improvements that were necessary in 2014. We largely handled these in 2013, when we tackled a lot of deferred maintenance, (replacing heating systems, sidewalks and purchasing a new grand piano.) We did update the front of the parish hall, largely though donated parishioner labor.

Nonetheless, it takes a lot to maintain an historic property, and we spent close to \$1,000 a month on maintenance in 2014. That number seems right for what we will likely spend in 2015 as well. We'll certainly have to update the Peaceful Warrior side of Okie Hall. And we discovered that we have some leaks in our roof that need to be addressed ASAP.

As mentioned above, 2014 was a year of transitions. We welcomed Stephen Karr, as our new music director. He was relocating to this area from New Jersey with his family, and we got the benefit of his skills from Feb. 2014-Jan. 2015. Having bought a house some 65 miles from the parish, he has since moved on to another position (in the Episcopal Church) closer to his residence.

Last year, we bid "farewell" to our parish administrator of many years, Chandra Boughton, who relocated to Tennessee and welcomed our new parish administrator, Sylvia Villalobos. Sylvia has been growing in that role and has brought her own talents and skills to the position, e.g., finding: unexpected cost saving in our telephone contract, and coordinating parishioner volunteer help in the office.

We are in the midst of another transition, which we are working hard to ensure goes as smoothly as possible. In December, Duke "Master Earl" Welliver announced his retirement from leading and teaching our Tai Kwon Do ministry, Peaceful Warriors. Duke has led this ministry since its inception, ten years ago, and we've been planning this transition for more than a year.

We are forming a board of directors for Peaceful Warriors which will consist of Duke and at least three other parishioners. This board will ensure: that this ministry continues to instill the values that Duke has always taught; that the interests of the parish are respected; and that Peaceful Warriors continues to have a voice within the parish and vestry. In short, to ensure that Peaceful Warriors this remains a ministry of the parish.



In my own life, I've had quite a transition. Christina and I welcomed our daughter, Gabriella, to the world in August. Around that time, I took about 3 weeks of paid parental leave, for which I am very grateful to you. This was a time of bonding for us, and allowed me to be of help to my wife. I am deeply grateful for the love and support of this parish (with prayers, meals and visitations) during that time.

While I was away, we completed a survey of the parish, which gave us great insights and helped us to focus our energies for the years ahead. The vestry went on retreat and discussed at length the results of the survey and planned specific actions and offerings in response. New programs were suggested, and we turned our emphasis to meeting the needs of families and letting our light shine beyond our doors. During my absence, our asst. rector, The Rev. Shireen Baker, did an exemplary job leading the parish. She led our services well, and responded to parishioner pastoral needs. She was commended by parishioners upon my return. You can read more about Shireen's other accomplishments in 2014 in her report contained herein.

The benefits of having a full-time assistant rector have been manifold. In addition to the benefits noted above, I've been permitted to do more evangelism in our community. I've been afforded more time for sermon preparation. I've been able to provide parishioners with more and better pastoral care. It has made it possible for us to expanded Christian Education offerings.

I've also been able to participate in ecumenical groups locally. I simply did not have time for this, when we were a one clergyperson parish. We are seeing the fruition and blessings from these relationships with other denominations, including shared concern and joint action for the needy, interdenominational holiday concerts, and greater understanding among our denominations.

In 2014, we were blessed to have good financial support of the parish. Our pledge campaign was a success. We also received a matching grant that inspired our people to step up with an additional \$12K over their pledges. We had excellent fundraiser concerts, led by our wonderful singers. And we had a spectacular silent auction, which drew support from local business and the greater community.

In short 2014, was an amazing year! Thanks to you and your support. I'm excited about 2015, and the possibilities that God has in mind for us. I believe this will be a year of stability and growth. It will be a year when several folk will take up new ministries and leadership in our parish. May God bless us always as we seek His will in all things.

2014 has been quite a year here at Saint Clement's. A great year, in fact.

I was ordained on January 11, 2014 and I was so happy to be surrounded by the warmth and kindness of this parish family. I celebrated my very first Eucharist here at Saint Clement's on January 12 and have had such joy leading Sunday worship here ever since. This parish has given me the opportunity to grow in my ministry in a warm and loving environment. Being here has provided me with the challenge of regular preaching and I know that I have grown in confidence in that department, though I feel there is always room for improvement. Still I have felt nothing but encouragement from this community.



The year started off with a rather large event, the Deanery IX and X Women's Retreat. I had the opportunity to put together the Liturgy for that event, and was overjoyed to have the Bishop use it again the following weekend at another women's event. I also had fun leading an Anglican Rosary workshop which was well received and a truly fun opportunity for me.

We also started the year off with Episcopal 101 classes. We learned about such a wide variety of topics including the Creeds, saints and Heaven and Hell. The classes were always lively with discussion. Learning and fun was had by all.

In Lent a small but loyal group participated in the Lenten Movie series where we watched movies and looked at their spiritual and religious underpinnings. We also, as a parish, participated in Lent Madness. Many People filled out their brackets and voted each day for their chosen saints and at the end of the day we had two winners who took home a lovely prize which included a Lent Madness mug.

I went to some of the City Planning Meetings in support of those who are working so hard to create a Homeless Shelter here in San Clemente.

I started an Escuela Dominical or Sunday School for the children who attend the Spanish Service. This has provided me with the opportunity to learn more about all that goes into teaching children about their faith. It has been a fun challenge to work with these kids.

I had the opportunity to go to Camp Stephens and be a chaplain for a week. It was a marvelous experience that included sleeping outside on the ground and singing around campfires. My job was to be there with the kids, some of whom were homesick, some who were having trouble fitting in, I was there to

offer support to both the campers and the counselors alike. It was both a fun and educational experience and an experience that I will not forget.

In August Father Patrick went on leave and I was given the challenge of being the priest in charge. While I missed having the Rector around, it was a great opportunity for me to see what it would be like in a parish where I was the only priest. It definitely provided a great chance for me to learn about what it meant to be a rector. I happy to say that the church was still standing at the end of August, and everything went smoothly till Father Patrick's return.

We had a great Beach Clean-up day this September. A lot of parishioners participated in that and we had t-shirts which was real fun. And several of us took a trip to the Laundry Love event in Huntington Beach. We got to see how the operation worked and we got to help out by assisting with the washing of clothes and the handing out of food and supplies. It was a truly interesting experience.

Father Patrick and I coordinate throughout the week to make sure that all the pastoral visits are taken care of and I help Father Patrick out with the Bible Study and the weekly e-blasts.

One project that is ongoing is the reworking of the library. It has been a slow project that Pat Morrison has kindly been helping me do. We have been cataloging all the books we have into a single database, organizing them according to subject. I hope to have that project finished soon so that we may have a functional library where parishioners can check out books if they like.

For Advent I started a new course called "Crafting Spirituality". It is a little outside the norm, and asks its participants to stretch their creative muscles, but it was a lot of fun, fun for the whole family, that asks us to look at the creative self as the very image of God in which we were created. It made the process of creating the focus, rather than looking at the process as a means to an end. I hope to do another session of the class in Lent.

Thank you again for your support in my growing ministry. I am sure I will continue to learn quite a bit while I am here at Saint Clement's by the Sea.

First the successes.

In addition, as the people's warden I initialed a monthly report in person at the Sunday services, with the highlights of our most recent vestry meeting. From the feedback, these presentations were well received.

Challenges.

The biggest challenge is to raise the number of pledging families and pledged dollars to support our ongoing operations. We have added new families and pledges, however we have also experienced some attrition. We look forward to the day when we can return to being a 15% contributor to the Diocese.

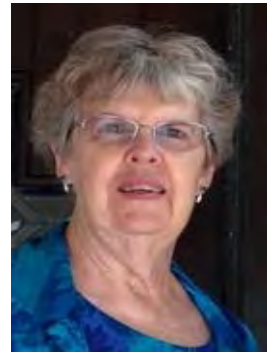

The past year has been one of reorganizing, updating and refurbishing. The following is a list of projects that have been completed or have been looked into for future cost and completion:

4. New Music Director's Office Refresh-COMPLETE

 - b. New Carpet
 - c. New Blinds
5. Blinds Installed for Administrators Office-COMPLETE
6. Cleaned out Janitor's Closet and Outdoor Closets
 - a. Removed Chemicals
 - b. Musty Mops
 - c. Trash
 - d. And a Church Bulletin Dated June 2010
7. Have Contacted ECOLABS and did a cost analysis for our cleaning, maintenance supplies, and for Pest Control expenses

10. Conducted Inspection of Kitchen to determine what is needed to recertify the kitchen for commercial use.

 - e. Make rooms Rentable for additional revenue

In February, our very own, Jim Pechous offered Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University, which is a study of biblical ways of handling money.

Father Patrick and Mother Shireen offered an Episcopal 101 series, which covered theology and the history of the church. They also hosted the Lent Movie series. Movies that have a spiritual or theological theme were selected, viewed and discussed. To celebrate the Advent Season, Father Patrick taught a Spirituality series in which the focus was the Birth Narrative in Luke. Mother Shireen provided a Crafts and Spirituality series which was thoroughly enjoyed.

Sarah Harrison, who leads our Sunday School program, continues to provide excellent instruction for our young church members. Each week she teaches a lesson that correlates with the lessons that we hear in the main service. She has done a fantastic job of keeping our children excited about coming to church. The year was capped with our annual Children's Christmas Pageant. The children, under Sarah's instruction, performed beautifully. It was wonderful to hear their sweet voices singing traditional Christmas Carols.

Our Latino Service now includes Sunday School instruction for the children after the 12:00 service, provided by Mother Shireen.

Our Youth Group, Rite 13, for ages 10-13 is led by Gwendolyn Wilson and the Rev. Shireen Baker. This group's focus is to enhance the Christian education of our pre-teen and teenage youth through discussions regarding social issues and how they as Christians can make a difference in their community. This group has performed several service functions including running a game booth at the San Clemente Winter Carnival.

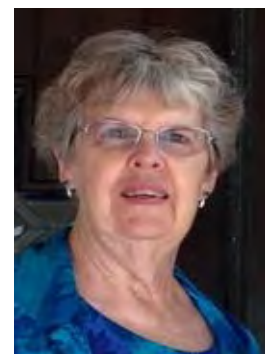

Finance Report

We began 2014 with the potential of a large deficit, but received a matching challenge grant from an anonymous source, for \$12,000. Parishioners quickly matched that challenge, and we were able to present the congregation with a budget that was essentially balanced for 2014 at our annual meeting. Over the course of 2014, due to pastoral and other circumstances, a few large parishioners were not able to fulfill their pledges. As we entered November, we were facing a considerable deficit for the year.



Thankfully, a successful silent auction event resulted in over \$14,000 of additional funds. We didn't quite reach our fundraising goal for the year, of \$25,000, but we came close with over \$21,000 in funds. And even though a few large pledges were unfulfilled (as noted above), we received two unexpected gift (of about \$20,000 and another for \$12,000), resulting in revenue that was \$4,366 above our expectations for the year, and about \$40,000 more than last year.

Some of our expenses were higher than we anticipated at the beginning of the year (maintenance and health insurance were standouts). The net result is that we ended the year with a \$454 surplus, which is a considerable change from the @ \$49,000 deficit we faced at beginning of November. Your vestry deserves great appreciation for their fiscal responsibility and hard work to eliminate that deficit by year end.

For the first time in some years, actual pledge revenue received did not exceed the amount that was pledged. Though some parishioners certainly gave more than they had actually pledged. The end result is probably due to the circumstances noted above, and Fr. Patrick believes that we have also converted more of our regular givers (but who were not pledging) to make a pledge to the parish for 2014. The year-end statements were sent out recently and there are a number of statements with a difference between what was pledged and what we received. We hope that those statements will help anyone who is behind to bring their balance current. The additional revenue this year will be a needed help, as you will see during the budget presentation.

As we enter 2015, we have received 88 pledges of support. Of these forty-seven remained at the same level as 2014. Twenty-four have increased their pledge. Seven new pledges have been received. And only ten have decreased their pledge. This level of support shows a great deal of trust and confidence in the future of our parish. Yet we are still awaiting pledges from a few families and individuals, which we hope will pledge TODAY. As of this writing, we have \$290K pledges for 2015.

Love in Action

If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, “Go in peace, be warmed and filled,” without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead.



The Outreach ministry of St. Clement's is evidence of each of us reflecting Christ's love through action.

- ◆ Almost every parishioner was involved some time during 2014 in preparing the sack lunches that were delivered through the **Welcome Inn** food for the homeless: More than 1,000 meals were prepared by the three service congregations of St. Clement's and distributed to the homeless in Capistrano Beach as part of the ecumenical Welcome Inn program, which was started 27 years ago. Parishioners work together to pack the lunches on the third Sunday of every month in Okie Hall, rotating among the three services. The St. Clement's Outreach budget funds the purchase of food for this program. <http://www.welcomeinnoc.com/about.htm>



The St. Clement's Vestry allocates \$10,000 a year directly from the church budget to local faith-based nonprofit ministries in addition to the Welcome Inn program.

- ◆ **Family Assistance Ministries (FAM)** is providing food, shelter, and client aid to thousands of people in South Orange County, as well as collaborating with other social services organizations to provide referrals and medical screenings, immunizations, eye glasses, and more. FAM receives \$200 a month from the St. Clement's Outreach budget. Rite 13 youth and adults participated in the 27th annual Hunger Walk in October. St. Clement's parishioners also contributed toys, children's clothing, and gift cards to the Christmas collection for youth. <http://www.family-assistance.org/>
- ◆ **Mary Erickson Community Housing** promotes the well-being of working families in Southern California by increasing and preserving the supply of affordable housing. MECH established the first affordable housing complex in San Clemente and has since grown to include multiple properties and developments serving hundreds of families in Southern California. St. Clement's is a sponsor of the annual fundraise Sunset at Salt Creek, which many parishioners attend. St. Clement's pledges \$200/month to this organization. www.maryerickson.org

Through your pledges to the church, St. Clement's contributed more than \$44,132 in 2014 as our "Mission Share" to the Los Angeles Diocese, which distributes funds to worldwide mission activity.
