

#### Resurrection...

The season of Easter is a joyous time! Our churches are certainly full on Easter day, as even the most diehard agnostic wants to know that there is life beyond this life, and that they have a share in it! The Sundays immediately after Easter Sunday are distinctive for their accounts of Jesus' Resurrection appearances, usually coupled with stories from the book of Acts, showing how the community of faith responded to those appearances. That is to say, how we became the "Resurrection Community."



You are probably quite familiar with some of the Resurrection accounts. This past Sunday, for example, we hear of how Jesus' appeared to his apostles on that first evening, when they were hidden behind locked doors. That Thomas was not there. And how, when the other disciples told Thomas of their encounter, he obdurately refused to believe, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe" (Jn 20:25).

In the week ahead, we'll hear of Jesus appearing to the disciples again, this time by the Sea of Galilee where they've returned, thinking they could just go back to their old life. But Resurrection changes things! They are not the same as they were before, relationships are transformed, and they are no longer fishers of fish, but fishers of people. (This event also provides the opportunity for Peter's restoration through his three-fold affirmations that he "loves" Jesus, countering his earlier denials).

There are other Resurrection accounts. Saul's conversion experience on the road to Damascus could be called a Resurrection encounter (Acts 9:1-19). Saul, also called Paul (Acts 13:9), certainly counted it as such. He writes, "[Jesus] was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters...Then he appeared to James...Last of all...he appeared also to me" (1 Cor 15:4-8).

One of my favorite Resurrection stories, and perhaps one that is familiar to you is the "Road to Emmaus," where Jesus begins to walk along with two of his disciples as they return home from Jerusalem on the very day of the Resurrection.

Their hearts are broken by all that they had witnessed on Good Friday, and the entombment of Jesus. Their minds disoriented and disbelieving the stories they had heard of the empty tomb. Jesus walks some distance with them, and as he speaks their hearts begin to burn within them.

There is something comforting and inspiring about this companion who has joined them on the road. Still, it isn't until they are at dinner together, and when Jesus takes, blesses and breaks the bread, that they are suddenly aware that they are in his presence. Perhaps they've just looked at him for the first time since their journey began. No sooner do they recognize him than the moment is over, he disappeared from their sight, and they look at each other, stunned! Such are the moments of divine revelation, grace-filled but often instantaneous.

I should mention that I was blessed to visit Emmaus when I was in the Holy Land. Well, at least one of the places that claims to be Emmaus (in this case, Abu Gosh). There are nine such places that profess to be the biblical Emmaus.<sup>1</sup> No one is absolutely sure which is the true Emmaus. Four such sites are considered by scholars as much more probable than the rest. Luke mentions "sixty stadia" from Jerusalem, about seven miles. Abu Gosh is that distance and on a main road. Today, there is a lovely, convent church there.

But some ancient versions of Luke read "a hundred sixty stadia," more like seventeen miles. There is a town, Emmaus Nicopolis, at that distance, which perhaps was named later to coincide with the distance. Or maybe it was the Emmaus and that is why some versions of Luke have it as 160 stadia instead of 60, a scribal correction to the text to more accurately connect it to the actual town. Again, no one is certain. What Luke does tell us is that disciples got up from their meal and immediately returned to Jerusalem!

They rush to report to the other disciples that they have seen the Lord. Now if Emmaus Nicopolis is truly the place, then these disciples had a much more substantial walk ahead of them, and would have journeyed thirty four miles total that day. But, inspired by seeing the Resurrected Christ, I'm sure, they could have walked a hundred miles and scarcely felt it. Honestly, couldn't you? If you saw Jesus in the flesh, raised from the dead, with your own eyes, what then for you would be impossible?

There are other Resurrection appearances. And the community of disciples that became the Church is one that was shaped by the experience of the Resurrection. There is arguably no clarion call more recognizable in all of Christianity than "Alleluia, Christ is Risen! The Lord is risen indeed, Alleluia!" We are those who look for resurrection everywhere, confident that God can and does bring new life and surprising freshness to that which we thought was lifeless or beyond rescue.

The Spring provides us ample opportunity to see resurrection in the world around us. What were some months ago just brown hills, draught-barren and seemingly lifeless, are now bursting with green and gold. As I hiked recently among the red, Indian Paintbrush, blue Lupine, orange Poppy and the flowering yellow, Coastal Sage, I was overwhelmed by the sense of new life that is in our midst. The very creation testifying to the goodness of God and his ability to bring forth life from what seemed to us pretty lifeless no long ago.

We may experience resurrection in our relationships too. Perhaps these are relationships with family or friends with whom we have disagreed, relationships damaged or broken by time, believed by us to be irreparable. And yet, Christ enters in, and what was lifeless and bleak again is breathing and pulsating with possibilities. These are but reassuring external signs of the reality of the Resurrection, which of course tells us of Christ's absolute victory over death. Christ is alive, and as he promised, those who believe in him have already passed from death to life. Such is God's great love for us. Christ is raised, and we are raised with him. We share in resurrection life.

## - Pergola & Columbaria Projects -



St. Clement's submitted three capital improvement projects for building permits in May, 2018. This article provides an update on the status, with the good news that we are now in the final steps of receiving building permits for the pergola and the columbaria. There are three major steps, and two have been cleared and we have been told that on May 6 we will receive a building permit or receive a list of final conditions to clear before a permit will be issued.

The gates were removed from the submission process by agreement of Father Patrick and the Columbarium Committee because the historical design compatibility requirements by the City (custom wrought iron, panic bars, custom embellishments) made the gates unaffordable.

Construction will begin on the pergola once we receive the building permit and the contractor can schedule the work; all funds have been received for the pergola. It is a gorgeous wooden structure that is stylistically integrated with our Spanish Colonial Revival style church buildings.

The columbarium (a single structure) is now columbaria (plural) because the city historic design review board recommended an altered design of two structures with a lower height, approximately the same height as the wall surrounding the Memorial Garden where the structures will be placed abutting the side of the sanctuary. It is a lovely design and the St. Clement's Columbarium Committee and Father Patrick accepted the City's recommendation. Because there will be two half-high structures each person who has purchased a niche will be contacted during the summer to select a new niche location. The lead time from the columbaria vendor is almost six months because of the custom granite niche faces; construction is relatively simple so our best estimate is that we will be able to receive ashes into the columbaria near year end.

It has been a team effort to traverse the city process. Special thanks to Mike Badstubner, who started the process and has been the "city navigator" this whole time. Also to Jon Ulz for working with the designer and engineer, and Roger Morrison for sales support. And Father Patrick for his support, review, and the prayers that we have needed these past 12 months.


Revised Plan for Two Columbaria

## - Rectory Updates -



The Rectory renovation project began with the application for a matching \$10,000 forgivable loan with the City of San Clemente. Needless to say we have had many hurdles to overcome throughout the approval process. The most onerous was the city inspector's original belief that the property had been previously expanded without a permit or city knowledge. This assumption slowed the renovation project down by 3-4 months. Thankfully, Roland and Audrey Daigle found the original rectory building blueprints, which reflected that the suspected addition was actually part of the property's original building plan!

The City of San Clemente then gave us permission to proceed with our renovation. This proposal encompassed \$20,000 of renovation; new windows, stucco repair, and whole house exterior painting. St Clements and the city each deposited \$10,000 in an escrow account. The loan from the city will be forgiven over five years under the condition that we continue to rent the property at below market rates to lower-income families or individuals.

Additional renovations to the Rectory exclusive of our agreement with the city included a new fence and proposed rain gutters to protect the stucco and new paint. The experience of improving a significant Church asset has been very rewarding.


