

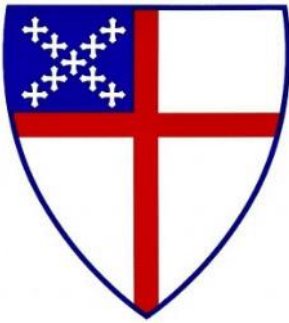

Saints...

This month's Anchor is a combined July-August edition, as we do every year at this time. Coincidentally, as I write this, we are marking the combined feasts days of Saints Peter and Paul (June 29). Talk about two powerhouse saints! And you might think, as I did, "shouldn't they get their own feast days?" And, of course, they do at other points during the Church year.

Peter is remembered for his confession, the first we find in the synoptic Gospel accounts, of who this Jesus really is, "you are the Messiah, the Son of the living God!" (Mt 16:16, see also Mk 8:29 and Lk 9:20). Some argue that this is the "keys" to the kingdom that Jesus speaks about after that confession is made. Though there are other interpretations obviously of what Jesus meant.

Peter is remembered for that bold confession on January 18th. It's interesting because saints are more typically commemorated on the day of their death (often, their martyrdom). We know a goodly bit about this Simon called "Peter," the former Galilean fisherman and brother of Andrew. We know he left everything at Jesus' invitation to come and follow. One of those "call stories" has Peter throwing himself at Jesus' feet and saying, "go away from me Lord for I am a sinful man" (Lk 5:8) in reaction to one of Jesus' early miracles. We could say, "aren't we all Peter!" He learns, in time, that there is no one better to turn to for the healing of that sin than the one he rightly calls "Messiah."

Peter struggles to fully comprehend Jesus' mission and the way it will unfold. He was looking for a different kind of Messiah perhaps. We know of his faithfulness to Christ, but also his denial in the moment of testing. Thankfully, he remains part of the community (in spite of his failing) and is not only restored (by Jesus after his resurrection), but made even stronger by the experience. He becomes a leader of the Jerusalem Church. Peter is one of Jesus' closest disciples and becomes one of his greatest apostles and evangelists. He surely knows his own human weakness and the truth of Jesus' words. He now knows where to find his strength, and comprehends the power of Christ' forgiveness.

Paul, likewise, has his human limitations. We know a great deal about this one who started life as a Pharisee (named Saul). Much of what we know of Paul come from his own letters (Epistles) that make up the earliest texts of the Greek Bible (what we call our "New Testament"). Paul is very candid about his human failings and his deep desire to be a better follower of Christ. Meanwhile you could hardly name a more successful church planter.

At great risk to his own physical safety and survival, even facing resistance from leaders in the early Church, Paul carries the Good News of Jesus throughout the known Gentile world, making converts in every place.

Paul too has his own commemoration day (on January 25th). In this case, it is the feast day when we remember his “conversion.” That is to say, the event we read about in the *Acts of the Apostles*, what we call Paul’s “Road to Damascus experience,” where he encounters the risen Christ, who calls Paul to a new life. It should be said, if you aren’t familiar with the story, that Paul was initially a persecutor of the early Church, having Christians thrown into prison for professing Christ and was at that very moment on his way to Damascus with plans to decimating the Church there. How interesting that Jesus would choose such a one as this to become one of his best evangelists.

Paul makes multiple missionary journeys. He is well-educated and knows his audience. He can argue with the best of the Greek philosophical practitioners of his day. He demonstrates incredible bravery in the face of physical peril and personal hardships. Regrettably, he runs afoul of Temple authorities and leaders in Jerusalem and is arrested. Being a Roman citizen, he appeals his case to the Emperor and is sent on a harrowing voyage to Rome, where he is imprisoned (we might say under “house arrest” nowadays). And it is from there that he writes to some of the churches he has planted. Ultimately, he is martyred, probably by beheading, and it is for this reason that these two saints are commemorated together on this day.

It is not that Peter and Paul didn’t know each other. They did. Their relationship was usually symbiotic but sometimes contentious. John Mark, who we attribute with having written the Gospel of Mark, seems to have been a follower first of Paul, then of Peter, then of Paul again. Further, there seems to have been some understanding that while Paul would work to bring the Good News to the Gentile world, Peter would do so the Jewish world (Gal 2:7-9). So combined, in a way, they were evangelists to the whole world (or at least a significant part of the Roman Empire). Peter is also martyred, also in Rome, but by a different means. He is said to have been crucified upside down. And as I say this is why we remember them together, for their martyrdom, and their combined contribution to our Church.

St. Augustine, in one of his sermons, puts it this way, “Both apostles share the same feast day, for these two were one; and even though they suffered on different days, they were as *one*. Peter went first, and Paul followed. And so we celebrate this day made holy for us by the *apostles’ blood*. Let us embrace what they believed, their life, their labors, their sufferings, their preaching, and their confession of faith.”¹

Our own Church’s National Cathedral is known as the Cathedral of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, as are others throughout the world. These two saints, pillars of the Church, are often remembered together, as their combined influence in the birthing of what became Christianity cannot be overstated. They both suffered so we would know Jesus today, and dare to follow him as they did. They were far from perfect. They were as human as you or me. They could be at times wrong-headed and petty. But they could also be incredibly faithful and self-giving. We commemorate them separately for the turning points in their lives. We remember them together today for their following Christ unto their dying day and surely with their dying breaths.

I’ll end with what our own St. Clement wrote about them in his letter (c. 96). “Let us come to those who have most recently proved champions; let us take up the noble examples of our own generation. Because of jealousy and envy the greatest and most upright pillars of the Church were persecuted and competed unto death. Let us bring before our eyes the good apostles—Peter...[and] Paul.”²

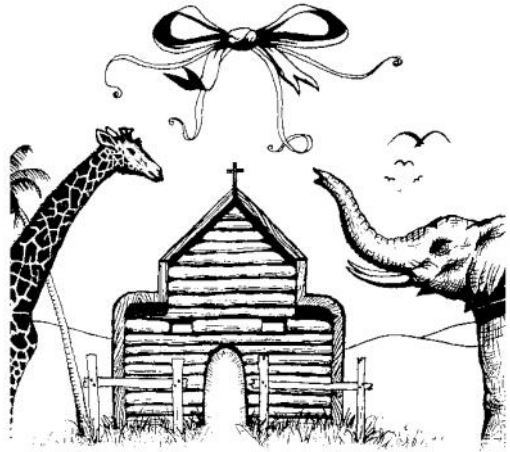

African Team Ministries, Inc.

Through Crafts and Jewelry

The African Team Ministries will be visiting St. Clement's and displaying handmade crafts for sale including woodwork, soapstone, and jewelry during Coffee Hour on July 22nd and July 29th!

The African Team Ministries is a Christian ministry working as an intermediary between African and American churches. With the help of the Episcopal Church, funding will make possible the distribution of Drip Irrigation Kits for families in the drought and famine areas to whom African Team Ministries provides emergency food relief. Over 250,000 people lost their lives during the recent drought and famine. Your support of this ministry will enable those in need to grow food year-round, as opposed to relying solely on rain water.

In addition to providing family-sized drip irrigation systems, the African Team Ministries help change the lives of those in East Africa by funding orphan and refugee relief missions and evangelism. The support received is sent directly to partnering Bishops, and provide school fees, tuition, books, and uniforms. This support ensures that sponsored children in Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, and Rwanda receive an education and measure of stability needed to rebuild their minds. With your support, children in need are given the gift of hope.

Not only is the work of the African Team Ministries assisting those in need through water, food, and education, they provide in many other ways:

Provide jobs for the unemployed women of East Africa. These women create crafts by hand for the African Team Ministries, which enables them to care for their children and parents.

- Keeping the Peace After You are Gone -

A will or trust contest can wreak havoc on families. The conflict can result in possibly irreparable resentment and loss of familial communication. Old rivalries and disputes can resurface during the trying time that occurs after the death of a loved one, especially a parent. Careful estate planning can help you substantially reduce the risk, or even avoid this problem entirely.

Let's take a look at a few of the ways you can build your estate plan to minimize family conflicts after you're gone.

- **Keep your plan up-to-date:** An up-to-date estate plan can help you preserve family unity after death or in the event of incapacity. Even if you have put an estate plan in place in recent years, estate planning is an ongoing process and needs attention at regular intervals.
- **Select key individuals in your plan:** Make sure that you've thoughtfully selected the right people to carry out your estate plan. A few of the key individuals you'll have to select are:
 - Successor trustee - This person will manage your trust's assets when you are unable to do so.
 - Executor - This person is appointed in your will to manage your probate estate if one is needed. In many cases, you may select the same person as your successor trustee. However, if you don't, remember that your executor must work closely with your successor trustee to ensure that everything is handled smoothly and in a timely fashion.
 - Health care proxy - This person is authorized to communicate with your medical providers and make medical decisions if you are unable to do so.
 - Financial agent - This person is authorized to make financial decisions on your behalf. They will likely need to work closely with your successor trustee, or you may designate the same person to serve in both roles.
- **Don't try to DIY:** While it might be tempting to cut corners and take your estate plan into your own hands, taking a do-it-yourself approach is never wise. This sets the stage for potentially inadequate planning, which increases the likelihood of will or trust contests and will likely mean your estate isn't distributed how you'd like it to be in the end. Let your estate planning attorney do the work.
- **Be clear about your intentions:** Are you planning on giving more of your total assets to one child than the others? Or are there other ways in which your estate planning goals may upset some of your beneficiaries? It can be a very tricky subject to broach, but if you foresee hurt feelings, consider being as clear as possible about your wealth distribution plans with those individuals. This will limit the potential for confusion and disagreement down the road. It may - or may not - make sense to explain this to your family. But, it's always important to let your attorney know the reasons so they can develop a rock-solid legal strategy for your goals.
- **Consider discretionary trusts:** If you have a child or other potential beneficiary who struggles with addiction, mental health problems, or other conditions that could hinder their ability to use their inheritance in a healthy way, you might want to consider a discretionary trust. With this type of trust, you can control the disbursements based on your beneficiary meeting certain requirements — such as attending a treatment program or enrolling in higher education. This can help you treat each child fairly by taking into consideration what is best for each child's unique situation.

Contact your estate planning lawyer to make sure your plan is current and includes all the necessary provisions to keep a contest from occurring in the future.

- Building Projects: Submitted to City for Review -

St. Clement's Buildings & Grounds Projects now include the columbarium, the pergola, and wrought iron gates. Our newest project addition, 5 wrought iron gates, is seen as necessary due to problems with illegal dumping of large trash items behind the Sanctuary. Additionally, evidence of drug use has been discovered behind the Parish Hall on more than one occasion. The proposed number of gates may be reduced during the review process. Our Committee Chair, Mike Badstubner, has told us that the application for Minor Cultural Heritage Permit was submitted for all 3 projects, and the process should be complete in 2-3 months. Upon completion, the Building Permit process will begin, and will take an additional 2-3 months.

Columbarium Niche Selection - Buy Now for Best Selection!

The proposed columbarium, which is a structure in the church Memorial Garden for the inurnment of sacred remains, has been well received by St. Clement's parishioners. We fully expect to meet the required minimum number of 25 sales by the time the project is permitted by the City of San Clemente.

Niche selection is first-come first-served

While there are plenty of niches in the columbarium, because it is designed to serve the needs of St. Clement's for a long time, people do have preferences of niche location. The eye-level niches and along each end seem to be the most popular. The sooner you purchase your niche (which holds two urns) the more niche choices you will have. It is also helpful in the church planning process to know the number of initial participants.

You can select and purchase a niche at the church office from Alicia during office hours, 8:00am-1:00pm, Tuesday through Friday. Payment by credit card can be done in the church office.

You can also turn in the paperwork and your check to Columbarium Committee members Roger Morrison or Judy Johnson. The Vestry has authorized a pre-construction price of \$1,000 for each two-urn niche until September 30th, 2018. Effective October 1st, 2018, the price increases to \$1,500.

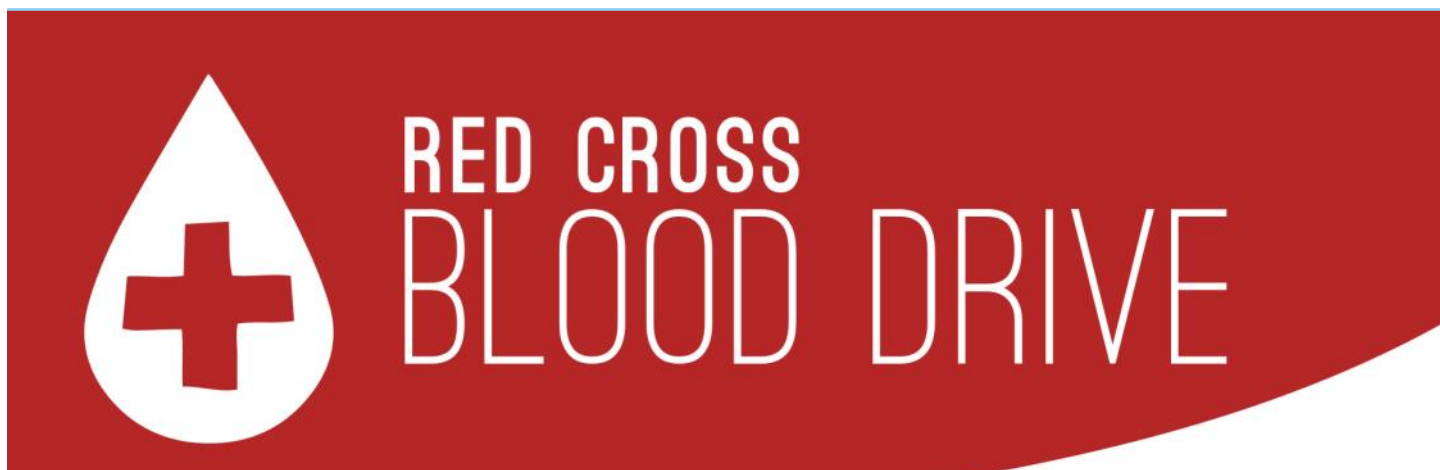

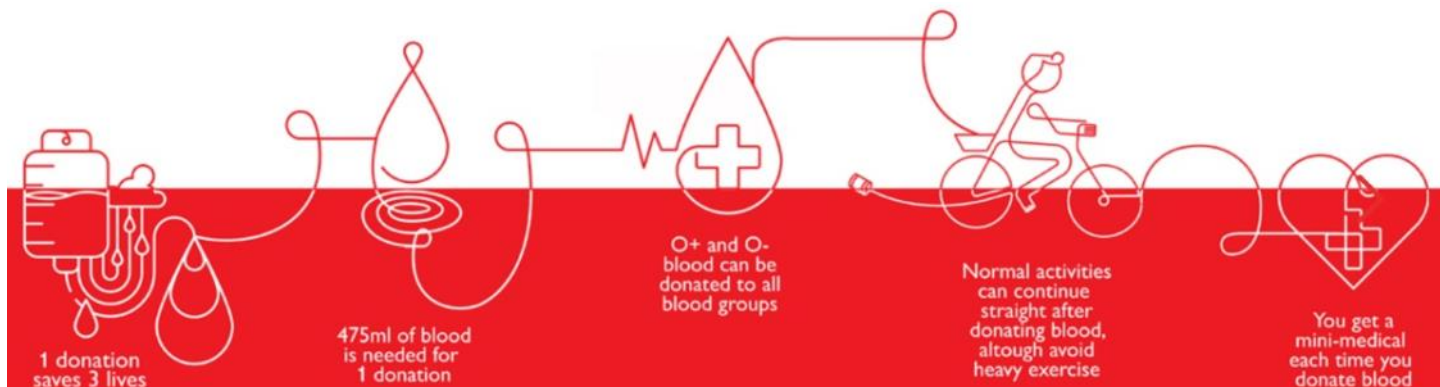
