

Holy Week...

In a short time, friends, we will mark that holiest time in the Church year, Holy Week. Each of the days of Holy Week has its own emphasis as we journey with Christ toward his cross, death, burial and entombment and prepare ourselves for his unexpected rising and conquering of death. Christians have marked this time liturgically, since at least the 4th century, when pilgrimages to Jerusalem were more possible and folk had a natural tendency to want to reenact the events of Jesus life.¹



Of course, Holy Week really begins with Palm Sunday, and Christ' triumphant entry into the holy city, Jerusalem. We begin that day with great joy and fanfare, but soon find ourselves overcome by the cries of "Crucify Him!" seemingly from the same crowd that only moments before had cried out "Hosanna to the Son of David." Palm Sunday is in some ways an overview of the week ahead, and if you are only able to attend one service in Holy Week, let it be that one. But, each day is significant and can make your Lenten observance even more meaningful, your understanding of what and why Jesus endured what he endured more complete.

On Holy Monday, we have Jesus' anointing at the hands of Mary, the sister of Lazarus. This is variously described in the gospels, but all have some version of it, i.e. it's important! In some accounts, the woman, sometimes named, sometimes not, anoints Jesus' head, as kings and priests would have been anointed in biblical times. In other places, she anoints his feet. Whatever the case, it is an extravagant and intimate gesture of great love, and Jesus interprets it as preparing him beforehand for what is to come in the days ahead (knowing that there would be no time after his crucifixion, as evening falls and his body is hastily put into a donated tomb).

On Holy Tuesday, we hear of the "Cleansing of the Temple." Some historians argue that this was the precipitous event that led the Romans to want to put Jesus to death, that his action was a direct challenge to the Pax Romana. This view isn't supported by the gospels which tend to show Jesus' action as rather a challenge to the entire system of sacrifices and offerings in the Temple. That is to say, his was a challenge to the entire religious order of his day, and those that supported it. Solidifying the religious authorities' opposition to him and his movement. In recent years, our lectionary has changed the readings for Holy Tuesday, and instead inserted the Last Supper here. But, I'm more of a traditionalist in this circumstance and continue with the "Cleansing of the Temple" on Holy Tuesday.

Tenebrae is observed on Holy Wednesday. This is a night when we remember Judas' betrayal of Christ to those in power (selling Jesus out for thirty pieces of silver), and Jesus' abandonment by those closest to him. The service itself is unique. It is not a Eucharist, as the others are. Rather, it is a service of increasing shadows. We dwell with Christ in the human experience of betrayal. We experience in some ways what that must feel like, we meditate on that loss as we consider perhaps our own culpability and the times we have turned our backs on our beloved Messiah. The light gradually dimensions as the forces that rebel against God seemingly gain the upper hand, only to see the light that the darkness could not overcome restored to its rightful place.

Maundy Thursday is that day when we remember Jesus' Last Supper with his beloved disciples. The event, as St. John has it in his Gospel account, when Jesus unexpectedly gets up from the table, ties a towel about his waist, and kneels before each of disciples to wash their feet. I am always deeply affected by the fact that Jesus washes Judas' feet too. This entire service illustrates Jesus' amazing example of his servant leadership. And as the name "Maundy," which means "Commandment" in Latin, suggests this is the time in which Jesus gives us a new commandment, to love one another as he has loved us. The service ends with a stripping of the altar, and the "Great Watch," as Jesus and his disciples move from the supper to the garden at Gethsemane to pray.

Good Friday takes us from the arrest of Jesus, to his trial and condemnation, his journey through the streets of Jerusalem, carrying his cross. We begin at noon with the Stations of the Cross, the Good Friday liturgy follows, when we remember his crucifixion, especially the words that he spoke from the cross, and eventually his death and entombment. The liturgy is complemented by meditative music, until 3pm, the hour when scripture tells us that Jesus died upon the cross. Sacred silence follows for many of us through the next day, and until the first proclamations of Easter and Christ's miraculous resurrection!

I pray you can be with us for this journey. If your schedule allows, please join us at 7pm, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Join us for a lamb "Seder" at 6pm on Maundy Thursday and the service at 7pm, and then at 12pm until 3pm, on Good Friday. I assure you that this will be time well spent for your spiritual life. The great 50 days of Easter, of course, follow Holy Week. And, our time of prayer, penitence and contemplation of what Christ endured for us during Holy Week, rightly prepares us for that season of joy.
