

Identity...

It's been a bit of a modern phenomenon, the number of people who are getting their DNA results from companies like 23andMe or Ancestry.com. In fact, many of you have shared your amazing results with me in recent months. I guess a lot of people were given these genetic tests as Christmas presents and they're getting their results now. And what a gift that is, to give someone the opportunity to find out more about



themselves, things that perhaps they've wondered about for a very long time.

As I browsed the site for one of these companies, I had to chuckle when they claimed that they could tell me "how much Neanderthal DNA you inherited." I thought, "in my case, I'll bet it is a lot." My wife has often made the comparison! But seriously, these services can provide great insights into ourselves and our origins. They can sometimes confirm or debase myths that have persisted in our family systems or give us information if we haven't been fortunate enough to have a relative with a passion for genealogy.

Interestingly, what I've heard more and more as folk have shared their DNA pasts with me is how diverse their backgrounds really are. Truly, what is on our surface is surface, and we are all more of a hodgepodge within. Our genetic makeup is generally quite diverse with parts of our DNA from hither and yon. What does that suggest? Well, certainly that we really are all connected. Or, as our Prayer Book puts it, "O God, you have made of *one* blood *all* the peoples of the earth" (BCP, 100).

I've never had my DNA tested. We were blessed to have written family histories for many generations on both sides of my family. I think the one we have for my dad's side went back to something like the 1650's. I didn't realize how rare that is. I thought most people were so blessed, but that is not the

case. I've learned it is more rare than typical. I could still probably learn a lot about myself from doing one of these tests, and maybe one day I will. Was it Socrates or Plato who advised, "know thyself"?

I think at the heart of much of our genetic exploration these days is the desire for belonging. We folk wonder, "to what clan, tribe, people or group do I belong?" Who is (or was) my family? One of the great traditions that we have in the Church is one we observe in this holy season of Easter, when we tend to have Baptisms. Perhaps you've noticed, or not, that when we baptize someone we use only their first and middle name (if they have a middle name), and never their last name.

The idea is that at baptism we join a new family. We become part of the family of Christ. We are a new creation, sharers in the promises of God and fellow heirs with Christ of eternal life. We therefore have a new family name or surname. No longer, "Gabriella Rose Crerar" but thereafter, "Gabriella Rose – A Christian," child of God, sibling in the household of Christ, full member of the Church. I wonder how many of us have truly internalized that identity.

I'm no biblical literalist, but perhaps all our ancestry results should come back with "Grandpa and Grandma; Great Grandma; Great, great Grandpa and Great, great Grandma...and Moses and Zipporah (yes, he had a wife)...Isaac and Rebecca...Abraham and Sarah...[and finally] God! the Source of All Being." This is one of the emphases of Scripture, that we are in that spiritual lineage and family, and that we go back to Adam and Eve, who are representative (not literal) figures for all humanity and our interrelatedness. That all flesh shares the same tap root of existence, that being God the Father of all, who said, "let us make humankind in our image" (Gen 1:26) and saw what he created and determined it to be "very good" (1:31).


Also, in this Easter season, we hear much about what the family of Christ was like in its earliest years. The stories we find in the Book of Acts speak of a family that prayed together, that ate together and that shared their gifts with each other, "as any had need" (Acts 2:45). These are still the hallmarks of the Christian family today and the example to which many parishes compares themselves. This is what we strive for: living in such loving community that we truly are family, one to another. When I call you "sister" or "brother" those words have meaning, because they point to the awareness of our authentic relatedness and relationship.


Sunrise San Clemente Pier by Jim Prothero

- Conference: Evangelism Matters -



"Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!'" Isaiah 6:8

I was honored to have been appointed by the Bishop to represent the Diocese of Los Angeles in the Evangelism Matters Conference organized by the Presiding Bishop's Office. The conference took place from March 14 through March 17 in Cleveland, Ohio in the beautiful St. Paul's Episcopal Church. More than 400 Episcopalians gathered at this event, joined by close to 20,000 people online. There were representatives of all the provinces of the church, including of course the IX Province, which is formed by Dioceses from Central and South America. People came all the way from Colombia, Venezuela, Honduras, Dominican Republic and almost every state to reclaim together the real meaning of Evangelism, a practice that unfortunately has been used to alienate instead of unite. The Evangelism practice ought to be generous, humble and spiritual.

The charge of the Conference was to remind us that "Jesus gathered people to serve the dream of God and form Beloved Communities that live not for themselves but for love of the world." The Episcopal Church is part of the ongoing movement of people who center their lives on Jesus and as Christians we are called to honor our baptismal promises to continue Jesus' teachings and fellowship and to seek and love God in all people. We are invited to share our stories and celebrate them; acknowledging and embracing the richness of our diverse communities.

There was time for community building, worshiping and learning. There were more than twenty workshops available and we even had time to join a "Revival" service, done the Episcopal way so do not worry! Please feel free to ask me about that experience. I am grateful to have had this opportunity and I'm looking forward to the way the Holy Spirit and this Diocese is calling us to practice more intentionally Evangelism because it does matter!

- Announcing a Columbarium at St. Clement's! -

Columbarium sales beginning April 15th!



Architectural rendering of future columbarium

Key Points:

- Pre-Construction Price of \$1,000 per niche (holds 2 urns) until Sept. 30, 2018
- First come, first serve selection of niche location
- Columbarium to be located in Memorial Garden
- Subject to city permit approval (in process)
- Estimated availability of columbarium is 1Q 2019
- Sales information from Roger Morrison or Judy Johnson
- Information available at coffee hour or in the parish office

This beautiful setting adjacent to our historic church will provide a sacred resting place for the cremated remains of those with a connection to our church.

A Dedicated and Holy Place for Christian Burial

Spiritual Site for Final Resting – The columbarium affords church members and their families and others united in Christian faith a final resting place on the grounds of the church which has been central to their lives, a sacred site where their loved ones can visit.

Simplicity of Planning – The purchase of a columbarium niche (holds two urns) at St. Clement's eliminates the pressure and expense of choosing a burial location and urn or casket/vault/ headstone at time of bereavement. St. Clement's provides pastoral care, the burial service and interment.

Faithful Stewardship — As a ministry of St. Clement's, the cost of interment in the church columbarium is much lower than other options for remains. Cremation is much less costly than in-ground burial costs of caskets, vault, and headstone or interment of ashes at another facility.





- Answers to Common Questions -

What is a columbarium?

A columbarium is a structure providing niches (sacred spaces) for the permanent placement of urns that hold cremated remains. Each niche holds up to two urns. This columbarium will be 9'5'' wide x 7'5'' tall x 16'' deep. There will be 117 niches (9 high x 14 across).

How is this being funded?

The Vestry has authorized construction once 25 niches are purchased. The balance of the construction cost will be paid by St. Clement's. As additional niches are sold the loan from the church will be repaid by the Columbarium fund.

What is the timing for the columbarium?

It is expected that a building permit will be issued by the City of San Clemente in the fall of 2018. The columbarium could be completed around March of 2019 if an order is placed when the permit is issued. The Vestry of St. Clement's has authorized a purchase order to be placed once 25 niches have been sold.

What are the costs for members of St. Clement's?

For members of St. Clement's the pre-construction sale price is \$1,000 for a niche (holds two urns). After Sept. 30, 2018 the price will increase to \$1,500. The time-of-need price for one bronze urn and inscription on the granite niche plate for one person is \$400. Niches may be purchased at the parishioner price for family members of parishioners. Parishioners also have the option of purchasing a memorial tile inscription (\$500) in the church courtyard.

May I select the niche that I want?

Yes. Niche selection is on a first-come first-served basis at time of purchase; a certificate is issued at time of purchase with the specific niche assigned.

Can other people be interred here?

Yes. This is a space for Christian burial. Members of other Episcopal congregations and other churches in communion with the Episcopal Church may be eligible, and others at the discretion of the Rector of St. Clement's. Please refer to the Columbarium Packet for pricing details for non-parishioners.

How do I purchase a niche in the columbarium?

A Columbarium Packet has all the information you need. Niches may be purchased from the Columbarium Committee during this period. Payment in full is required at time of purchase; credit cards accepted.

How are arrangements handled for interment?

The church, through its priests and designated staff, shall arrange with the family of the deceased for the interment of the cremains and a committal service. Parish staff will arrange for the inscription of the niche plate. The family is responsible for any desired engraving of the urn (which is sealed in the niche).






