

Nicholas...

For the December/January edition of the *Anchor Newsletter*, I typically write a reflection on the three seasons of the Church that we encounter during these months, namely: Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany. However, I'm carrying around a little joy in my heart these days as we approach the feast day of St. Nicholas, and I felt the need to once again share a word about him. Because, you see, I'm still amazed at how few people realize that "old Saint Nick" was an actual person. I've spoken to you about him



a few times over the years, so you certainly know, don't you? But, here's a little refresher in case some of his story has slipped your memory.

Saint Nicholas is better known as "Santa Claus," of course, but the historical Nicholas (c.270-343) was an actual saint of the Church and was bishop of Myra (a town in modern-day Turkey) in the fourth century. Often on his feast day, my wife will drop off cookies at our neighbors' houses and include with them three small bags of those gold foil covered coins that have chocolate inside. While the neighbors always like the cookies (who wouldn't), they often are perplexed by the gold coins. That's because they may never have heard the story of St. Nicholas and so don't know of the coins' significance.

As you might imagine, I'm only too happy to share the story of one of beloved saints! The most famous of those stories goes something like this. There was a man who had been blessed with three daughters. But he was a poor man, and in those days a dowry was required when it was time for a young lady to marry. The prospects for any woman who could not marry, in those days, were bleak, indeed heartbreaking. The man did not know what to do, for he was also a proud man, too proud to ask for help and he would not accept charity from anyone.

As the oldest of his daughters reached marrying age, the man despairs. What would become of his beloved daughter, as he was aware that he could not provide what was needed for her. Our good saint also knew of their plight, for they were a faithful family as well. And on passing by the house one evening, well after dark, Nicholas tossed a small bag of gold coins through an open window to provide for the young lady's dowry. She was rescued from what would have been a miserable fate and could eventually wed.

Everyone rejoiced at this miracle, but the father, though elated was also suspicious. Remember he was a proud man. Time passed and life continued, until the second daughter reached the age to marry, and the man again began to worry. "How," he wondered, would he provide for this beloved daughter? He'd never be able to do so, given his limited means. One night, after dark, again came the good saint, who throw another bag of gold coins through an open window. The family was saved and the girl could marry.

But, this time the father was a bit indignant. "A miracle once perhaps," thought the father, "but twice?" He wasn't one to take anyone's charity, even if it was for a good reason. When the third daughter came of age, the father was on the lookout. He watched every night through the window at the passersby and stayed awake. He was too proud. But, our enterprising saint outsmarted him, climbing up the chimney at the end of the house and onto the rooftop, he dropped the bag of gold down through the chimney, where it fell right into the youngest daughter's stocking that had been hung there to dry in front of the fire.¹

She found it in the morning and was delighted to tell her father of the third miracle, that saved her from a life of destitution and hardship. The father, who had stayed awake to watch had to acknowledge that he had no idea from whence that saving grace had come. And so had to rejoice with all his daughters at the blessings they had received. And so, to this day, we remember Nicholas and those three bags of gold coins, which we sometimes find in our stockings that we hang in front of our fireplaces.

Nicholas becomes famous for his kindness toward children and his anonymous gift-giving (illustrated in the story above), from which we get the tradition of children getting presents "from Santa Claus." As with other popular saints, many stories arise about Nicholas. Some say that he saved the people of Myra from starvation during a famine. Others say that Nicholas successfully negotiated with the emperor to lower taxes on the people who were struggling to meet them. They also say he preached the gospel in a way that ordinary folk could understand it easily, and that he helped the poor and any who were in need, which is truly saintly, isn't it?

Nicholas has something in common with our patron, Clement, as both are saints of seafarers. England, a great seafaring nation, had at one point some 400 churches named for Nicholas.³ But it is Dutch actually who bring the name "Sinterklaus," or "Santa Claus" to the New World. Nicholas is often depicted wearing his bishop's attire, in his case, red with white trim, and with a white beard, showing both his age and wisdom. It doesn't take much imagination to see how these evolved into the big red coat and stocking hat that we see today. And, I'm guessing the Dutch were already representing him in winter attire (December 6th being rather cold in the Netherlands).

I'm not sure when Nicholas migrated from sunny Myra to the North Pole. But some things still harken us back to Nicholas' true roots; the candy cane, for example, which is shaped to resemble a bishop's staff. Surely, Clement Clarke Moore's poem, *Twas the Night Before Christmas*, has a lot to do with how we imagine "Saint Claus" today, arriving by a flying sleigh, led by Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner and Blitzen. But note that the sleigh lands on the rooftop, and that Santa brings his gifts down through the chimney, which has some resonances with that famous story of Nicholas above.

We do know the actual Nicholas was for a time imprisoned for his faith, under Emperor Diocletian, and that he had been subsequently freed when Constantine ascended to the throne. We know he made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. And that he may have been present at the Council of Nicaea. We know also that Nicholas is a patron saint of several countries, including most famously Greece. In the late eleventh century most of Nicholas' relics were taken from Turkey to Bari, Italy, where they are still revered. But, beyond this, not much is known.



And remember that if a young person ask you if Santa Claus really does exists, you can respond with all honesty, "old Saint Nicholas, he certainly does!"

ST. CLEMENT'S CHRISTMAS OUTREACH

This Christmas, because of your generous pledges and contributions throughout the year, St. Clement's has funds in our outreach budget to help others for Christmas. At the November Vestry meeting, the Vestry voted to help these charity organizations with their projects to help those in need. Below is a summary of our Christmas outreach projects.

MIRY'S LIST

This is an organization that has helped over 500 refugee families extending out from the LA area over the past 5 years with starting their new lives in America. As you can imagine, during the current humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan, demand has more than doubled in the past few months. Many of these families have worked with our military operations in Afghanistan. The donations cover essential supplies on arrival, like baby supplies, mattresses, clothing, school supplies, car seats and cell phones to families who have arrived here with basically nothing. Their programs provide hope and support where there is unimaginable hardship and need. Many more families are resettling in Southern California in 2022.

Our parishioner, Laura Casellas, is an ESL instructor with Miry's List and has been volunteering with them for the past year tutoring 2 Afghan refugees with their English skills to increase their participation in the community and workforce as they rebuild their lives here in California. SAN CLEMENTE BOYS & GIRLS CLUB

Every year, organizations in San Clemente reach out to the San Clemente Boys and Girls Club to assist with their annual Christmas gifts for the children who are enrolled in the Boys & Girls club. At the time we reached out to them to assess their needs for the children for this Christmas, they had 134 children with sponsors, but 15 plus children were lacking sponsorships. Every year SCMFO selects families in need on base who have limited funds to provide a Christmas for their families. Reasonable "wish lists" are received from the families for items to select to purchase, or gift cards can be purchased for the parents to purchase the needed items for their children's Christmas. SAN CLEMENTE MILITARY FAMILY OUTREACH (SCMFO) TOGETHER WITH MARY'S FEAST ARE HOSTING THEIR ANNUAL JANUARY 2022 BABY SHOWER

SCMFO is a ministry of St. Clement's. Members of our parish represent St. Clement's on the SCMFO Board of Directors and Volunteer Committee. Every year, SCMFO gives a baby shower for approximately 40 new or expectant mothers who receive complete layettes for their babies.

This year, as one of our Christmas outreach ministries, St. Clement's is participating in the baby shower by donating **new unwrapped baby gifts** appropriate for an infant or child up to 12 months of age.

Beginning with the 2nd Sunday of Advent on December 5, and extending until the 4th Sunday of Advent on December 19th, a Christmas tree will be in the parish hall. On the tree will be tags labeled with baby items the military families need. If you would like to participate in this outreach ministry, please select a tag from the tree for a baby shower item(s) you would like to purchase.

As we celebrate the birth of Jesus, we can bring much needed and appreciated baby items to the underresourced Marine families in need via the San Clemente Marine Family Outreach annual baby shower.
