

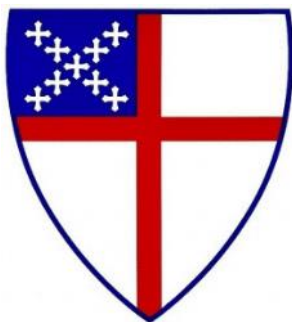

Nicholas...

A word of warning, before you read on, if you still believe in Santa Claus as the guy who flies around in a sleigh, led by eight reindeer, you may want to stop reading here. Typically, at this time of year, I've written about the rather serious topic of the character of these seasons: Advent, Christmas and Epiphany, which we experience in December and January. But the truth is, I'm not feeling so serious today, and thought we'd keep it a little lighter. So instead, I thought we could explore a little together about that most beloved saint, Nicholas, aka Santa Claus, who really is a saint in the Church, venerated for centuries, and who inspired the popular Santa Claus found in shopping malls everywhere.



We celebrate Saint Nicholas' feast day, December 6th, and in some countries, children might still get a little gift that day, while they have to wait until Christmas for their main horde of presents. Nicholas was the Bishop of Myra, a town in present day Turkey, though it was in Greek speaking at that time. He lived in the fourth century and possibly even attended and participated in the Council of Nicaea (from whence we get the Nicene Creed, though technically it isn't until the Council of Constantinople before that Creed got its finishing touches). Of course, as with any saint, there are countless stories that arise about Nicholas, including miracles that he performed.

The most famous is the one of a man of very limited means who has three daughters who are approaching the marrying age. He hasn't the money to provide for a dowry for any of them. Knowing of the man's predicament, and being aware of the hard life his girls would face in those times as unmarried women, the good bishop comes up with a plan. Nicholas knows also the father would refuse charity. So, on passing the house one day, Nicholas throws a small bag (or purse) through an open window, with sufficient funds for the first girl's dowry just at the time that she reaches marrying age. He does the same when the second girl reaches her age.

The father, who could perhaps accept the first miracle as a gift from God, starts to catch on after the second bag arrived. Determined not to take charity and to confront whoever it is who is providing these funds, he stays by the window watching when his third daughter is coming of age. So, our goodly saint, climbs up to the roof unnoticed instead, and drops the third bag through the chimney. An elaboration of the story has it that the girl had just been washing her stockings, and had hung them by the fire to dry, when the third pouch fell down the chimney and into her stocking. Well there you have it! The saint who gives gifts to children, the coming down the chimney and the stockings hung with care.

Nicholas was celebrated throughout Europe, as a patron saint of seafarers, sailors, and especially children. England, a great seafaring nation, had some 400 churches named for Nicholas. But it is Dutch who bring the name Sinterklaas, or Santa Claus to America. How that evolved into Kris Kringle and a guy who lives at the North Pole, and arrives by a flying sleigh, led by Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner and Blitzen, is anyone's guess. Surely, Clement Clarke Moore's poem, *'Twas the Night Before Christmas*, had a lot to do with it. But were all these images his invention, or were some of them already in the public imagination? Was the image of the saint already evolving?

Saint Nicholas is a patron saint of several countries, including most famously Greece. We know little about his life except that he did a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and that for some time he suffered for his faith. During the persecution of Christians under Emperor Diocletian, Nicholas was imprisoned and tortured. But he lived to tell the tale. Today, there is a bronze statue of him at his church in Demre, Turkey, but it was once removed in favor of a jollier, more Santa Claus looking plastic figure, by the then mayor. People reacted negatively, and the original was restored. In the late eleventh century most of Nicholas' relics were taken from Turkey to Bari, Italy, where they are still revered.

The most significant thing perhaps is that we remember Nicholas for his kindness to young people and his secret gift giving. That is why our children even today get presents from "Santa Claus." In some places, children leave out their shoes, and Saint Nick leaves them something in them by morning. Interestingly, this is a custom in some Spanish speaking countries at Epiphany. This is when the three kings (or wise men) brought gifts to Jesus. So, we can understand the gift-giving at that time. But what about leaving out the shoes? I wonder if that tradition was carried over from the celebration of Saint Nicholas' Day.

May you and your families enjoy an enlightening Advent, a delightful Christmas and an amazing Epiphany season.

- *Reflections on the Episcopal Revival* *in Diocese of San Joaquin* -

Wow, dear friends in Christ at St. Clement's. I just had the most amazing Episcopal experience over three days and 800 miles at the end of November, and I want to share some of it with you and invite you to learn more.

The event, or actually three events, was the Diocese of San Joaquin Revival. It took place in Stockton, Fresno and Bakersfield November 17, 18, and 19 as one of a series of Episcopal Revivals launched in early 2017.

An Episcopal Revival? Wow, what an intriguing thought. I thought we Episcopalians were the "frozen chosen", as Bishop Diane+ would challenge us by saying during her days as our rector.

But now, under the exuberant leadership of Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, the Episcopal Church USA has launched a series of revivals throughout the US. Each revival includes a series of gatherings that combine inspiring worship, compelling teaching, honest faith-sharing, intensified prayer, and **active** engagement with the mission of God – all for the sake of the spiritual renewal and transformation of people and of society. Each revival has been shaped around the individual diocese and its local issues and ministries. The Diocese of San Joaquin, which has a population that is 50% Hispanic and 33% immigrant, focused on immigration and DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals). There were many biblical passages cited throughout the revival commanding that God's people provide hospitality:

"So show your love for the alien, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt" (Deuteronomy 10:19)

"Truly I tell you, just as you did to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me"

(Matthew 25:34-40)

DAY 1:

The first day of the revival was held at the University of the Pacific in Stockton. Personal stories were shared from a variety of immigrants about their journey to America and in America – an Episcopal priest fleeing imprisonment and torture in central Africa, an Episcopal priest from Los Angeles who is in the DACA program and fears losing her work permit and her ability to work in the church, a lesbian woman whose adopted child was refused baptism in the Catholic Church because of her mother's sexuality, a transgender woman and Episcopal Deacon who lives in fear of the hate crimes against LGBT people.

These stories were intensely personal, told with tears and a clear desire to communicate their stories to members of the audience who may not have not suffered these adversities. Each also expressed appreciation to the Episcopal Church as a place of welcome and solace during their trials.

Presiding Bishop Curry concluded the revival event by challenging each person to take one action immediately, whether a letter or call to an elected official, assistance in outreach, or whatever their personal call may be. To view the video of Day 1, please visit: <https://vimeo.com/244044953>

- *Reflections on the Episcopal Revival* in *Diocese of San Joaquin* -

DAY 2:

Saturday's worship service was at St. James' Episcopal Cathedral in Fresno, one of the church properties recently returned to the Episcopal Church at the end of a long court battle. The event started with a Neighborhood Prayer Walk through the surrounding urban community, and stories told of community engagement including the Faith in the Valley ecumenical social justice organization and the food ministry of the Diocese. At the conclusion of the walk a service was held formally installing the Rt. Reverend David Rice as Diocesan Bishop of San Joaquin (he was previously Provisional Bishop).

The Most Reverend Michael Curry roused the congregation with his fiery sermon, stating *"We need this whole Episcopal Church to be a witness for our Lord. We need a movement of witnesses for Jesus."... If you want to scare Episcopalians to death, tell them they have got to go out and witness to somebody... But I understand, because I know that wherever there are two or three Episcopalians, there is always at least one lawyer. (Laughter and clapping from the audience). The words "witness" and "Episcopalian" are two words you rarely hear together. (more laughter). But, it's in the Bible, I am not making it up..."*

DAY 3:

Sunday was worship at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Bakersfield. The church is a vibrant congregation that has embraced all of God's people, with more than 60 young people in the church school program, most of them children in non-traditional families. Presiding Bishop Curry again roused the congregation to action, charging members and guests to love God and love their neighbors.

During my 200-mile drive back to San Clemente my mind and heart were full of the energy and biblical underpinning for the revival. The Diocese of San Joaquin takes as its motto, "Called to Be ...," with the "..." an integral part of that theme. With this Revival, the challenge for Episcopalians was very much what is each of us called to be? So it is fitting for me, as I reflect on this outward and visible journey, is what is God called me to be? Or said another way, "What am I doing to make this world a better place, and how can I do more?"
