#### Church...

Recently, I've been considering the various reasons why the people of God go to Church. And here I mean besides the obvious reason of the fourth commandment, to "Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy." But rather, what are the various motivations that inspire people to seek out a church in the first place, this is what has been on my mind. While, in some respects, this is always on my mind, it has arisen lately as we look at our communications, especially with those beyond our doors. That is to say, as we look at how we represent ourselves to the broader world, and to those who may be seeking a parish.



Three things tend to rise to the surface for me (and surely show my own bias). But, I think people seek a parish firstly because they want to know more about God. (1) They want to learn about or continue to learn about Jesus and his life, and how that life informs their own. So, worship, Christian education and formation are important, as is inspiration. People want to be inspired. (2) Secondly, I think that people seek a church for community. Church is a place where people form friendships and socialize, i.e. where they can be "the gathered people of God" – the literal meaning of the word "church" – together. So, belonging is a key motivation. (3) Lastly, I believe people seek a church for ways in which they can live their faith in meaningful ways. So, outreach, service and social justice are very important.

Almost everything we do could be categorized under one these three general themes. And as we look at the way we present ourselves, we might consider how easy it is for seekers to discover what we have to offer in response to those very human longings identified above. We certainly have much to offer in each category.

Responding to the first need is our worship, which has an unquestionable authenticity, rooted in centuries-old tradition (indeed harkening to the very beginning of the Christian movement and the churches that the apostles themselves started). We are scriptural, creedal and sacramental. Yet, one can rightly ask if such worship still connects and serves the needs of modern peoples. We believe that it does, and serves a real need in the denominational matrix, that rich tapestry of Christian expression. However, we also look for ways to improve our worship in order to ensure that it remains relevant, that the symbols that we employ and our style of worship does serve an actual need, and isn't just rote.

Of course, our Christian education programs would also be included in this first topic. Take for example: Our programs for children and youth, as well as our occasional adult programs.

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You could include our Lenten programs, ecumenical offerings, the classes that will be offered this coming Fall (which will cover the basics of scripture and faith, Church history, the sacraments, etc.), our Monday night meditation group, and our weekly Bible Study classes (in English and Spanish). These all have as their goal, I'd argue, learning about God and God's ways, or nearing oneself to God, and coming to know more about the experience of God that God's people have had since God first said, "Hello."

One might describe the second point above broadly as "Community." Obviously, we are parish that knows much about that. The examples that come to my mind here are our monthly "Anchors" dinners, and the deep friendships that form there. Our weekly Fellowship and Martini club, our Sunday coffee hours, our book club, these all would be included here. Also occasional events, like Cabarets, pizza nights and silent auctions, and the informal things that our parishioners do together, like going to the theater, or going to breakfast on Sundays (as many in the 8am crowd do). Our pastoral care to the homebound, disabled or recovering would be an example of this community, which truly cares for one another.

Many have described this parish as closer, in some ways, than their own biological families. And that says a lot about the sense of belonging that can occur here. Knowing how to welcome and receive people is also something we know something about. As evidenced by the slogan that emblazons our service bulletins and is hung on a big banner in our parish hall, "This Church of ours is Open to All!" Many find a welcoming acceptance here that they don't find in any other church. An aspect of that holy greeting is seen in the wonderful welcome baskets that Barbara Fox takes out to visitors and newcomers every month. You wouldn't believe the letters I get in response to those baskets. It is clearly a form of welcome many have never experienced at a church. And Barbara puts such love into each of those baskets.

Lastly, people do look to a church as a means in which to enact their faith and prayers in service to others. I've written of these opportunities here in the past and the pages of this newsletter often mention those activities. Not the least of which is our brown-bag lunches that we make for the hungry, our Laundry Love ministry, the space we provide here for recovery group meetings, our support and volunteerism to organizations like Mary Erickson Housing and to military families, and our advocacy on behalf of the needy or homeless in our community. Peaceful Warriors is also an extremely important ministry, as we provide an affordable and deeply meaningful program to the families of San Clemente. This is not a comprehensive list (in any of these sections) as other ministries do exist here.

Additionally, these three areas of focus inform and support each other. One learns a great deal about God through service to others and through the experience of community. That sense of community is often supported through both communal worship and Bible Study (for example), as well as by being engaged in service to the world with others. And that service to the world is strengthened through our understanding of Christ and the gospel imperative, while we joyfully work with others in a spirit of love. Take a ministry like the Altar Guild. It provides for our worship, but also fosters relationships and involves service. Peaceful Warriors, while an outreach, also creates community among the parents and connection with the Church.

As I've mentioned, there are certainly many other things that happen here that expand our knowledge and love of God, build our community and encourage our service. Further, these are also not the only reasons why people seek out a church. What about you? What were you seeking when you first decided to come to St. Clement's? If you were to add another item to the three broad areas mentioned above, what would it be?



### St. Clement's Celebrates Pentecost with English/Spanish service

St. Clement's parishioners from the 10 a.m. English and noon Spanish services joined in worship on Pentecost in a bilingual service. Rev. Deacon Nancy Key, Deacon at the Cathedral in the Diocese of San Joaquin, delivered the sermon. Below are some highlights of the sermon.

"As people of God, we believe in the Trinity – God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. But this God is not like a pie cut into three separate pieces; this trinity has no boundaries, and lives within and among us as people and as community so that we ourselves become part of this Holy Trinity."

Who is the Holy Spirit that descends on us this Pentecost day? I like the explanation in Eucharistic Prayer D:

"And, that we might live no longer for ourselves but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete the work of Jesus in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all."

The message is that this gift of the Holy Spirit is for the purpose of our "completing Jesus' work in the world." Which is what? Feeding the hungry. Comforting the troubled. Binding up the wounds of the sick and injured. Giving water to those who thirst."



Jim's 33 years of service as a high school English teacher was honored at St. Clement's on June 25 with a blessing during the worship service, and a reception at the 9 a.m. coffee hour. Jim taught at Saddleback High School in south Santa Ana for the past 31 years.

Jim is an active contributor to the St. Clement's community, sharing his many talents. He is a water colorist, and donated the picture of Father Okie that hangs in Okie Hall. He also donated the lovely painting of Poche Beach with the iconic American flag that was a popular raffle fundraiser last summer.
