Vestry Budget for 2013 Report: presented by Bill Schmiege. Reduction in Mission Share to Diocese from 15% to 12% was noted. Rector explained the painful process of cutting expenses in many areas and still having to deal with a deficit budget. Rector noted that in November 2012 we were facing a \$9,755 deficit. Yet, we ended 2012 with a surplus. Rector shared his desire to keep our funding to the diocese at the level it has been in the past. Rector shared with the congregation the vestry's decision to designate any surplus we might have for 2013 to the diocese first to restore us to the prior funding level.

Rector

2013 was another incredible year here at St. Clement's. It was in many ways a musical year. We had our **concert series** in both the Spring and Fall, which featured both outside musicians and many of our own, very talented, singers and instrumentalists. Thanks to the efforts of many parishioners, we raised the funds necessary for a new Grand Piano, as our prior piano was on its last legs. Our new piano arrived at the end of October, and everyone who has played it has been incredibly impressed. At the end of 2013, we received news that our music director and organist for more than a decade, Dan Resch, had received a call to a parish in Newport Beach and would be leaving us. Since that time, a dedicated group of parishioners has been discerning about our music program, and interviewing the music director for our future. I hope to be able to announce our new music director / organist soon.



In 2013, we called St. Clement's twelfth assistant rector, the Rev. Shireen Baker. A recent graduate of Virginia Theological Seminary, Shireen was sponsored for ordination from our diocese, and was raised up in her home parish of St. Thomas the Apostle in West Hollywood. Shireen arrived as a transitional deacon and was recently ordained to the priesthood. She has been a tremendous help to us. Since her arrival, Shireen has been active in leading worship, reading the gospel and preaching. She has made many pastoral calls, bringing communion to those who have difficulty being here on Sundays. She has provided important pastoral coverage as well, especially at times and on days when the rector is not available. On a recent Friday for example, the rector's typical day off, Shireen was able to respond to immediate pastoral need of a parish family needing last rites for their loved-one. In addition to the many and considerable gifts that Shireen brings to our parish, her presence here has allowed the rector time to pursue programming for our parish, that he simply did not have the time to pursue in the past. Such programming includes our Episcopal 101 class, which began shortly after Shireen arrived and continues to this day. This class has been very much appreciated by those who attend. Shireen's presence here also allows the rector more time to be involved in our local community, to visit with parishioners in their homes, and to do more evangelism in our neighborhood (all necessary for our spiritual and numerical growth). Both clergy share in the mentoring of our Rite 13 class, and we've learned that having a clergy presence among our young people is very much valued by our people.

I could go on about the value that Mother Shireen brings to St. Clement's, I would rather though like to focus on what we've given to Shireen. What she has found in us is a loving community where she can grow in her ministerial capabilities, where she can preach, teach and pastor. I've seen an incredible amount of growth in her in the last several months, including a great deal more self-confidence, a willingness to try things that she'd normally be a bit timid about trying, and she is learning Spanish at an alarmingly fast rate. Indeed, her accent is better than mine already. I have no doubt that Shireen will continue to grow in ways that are fulfilling to her and to us as a parish. For the year ahead, we've discussed Shireen's work with our young people, a movie and discussion group for adults that she would lead, and a program for our seniors that would include a quarterly luncheon. Further, we are exploring whether there is sufficient demand for a mid-week Eucharist.

In the area of **Christian Education**, I've already mentioned above the Episcopal 101 and Rite 13 programs. We also had our first full year with Sarah Harrison at the helm of our Sunday School program. She has done an exceptional job and I've been very pleased with the Christian education that our young people are receiving. Sarah's leader-ship and singing talent were also very present in our Christmas pageant. And any of you who were there know how special that program was. In addition to the Christian Education programs for youth, we had a wonderful Lenten program on the Psalms, and also continue to offer our weekly Bible Study. Parishioner Jim Pechous will also be leading an adult education series, called Financial Peace University. And we are exploring whether we could offer a program of discernment for people in the San Clemente area who are seeking direction in life or vocation. Discernment is actually something the Episcopal Church does very well. And surveys indicate a need here in our community.

2013 was another great year for **Stewardship**. In 2012, our Stewardship base, i.e. the amount of actual pledges received was about \$269,000. By the end of the year, we had actually received \$276,383, a difference of almost \$7,400. In 2013, we had received an 8.5% increase in pledges over the prior year, to \$287,121. However, as you'll hear from our finance chair, we actually received \$299,329, an almost \$12,000 difference. That's really super! So far for 2014, we have received promises or pledges for about \$320,000. That is an 11.5% increase over the pledges received the prior year. That too is really great news! However, it wasn't quite enough to cover the difference in our budget for the cost of having two full-time clergy. We received a one-time matching grant for \$12,000, and as of this writing we are only \$900 away from meeting that challenge grant!

In other good news, financially speaking, we raised some \$24,000 for the new piano mentioned above, whose delightful sounds you have no doubt enjoyed. We also received two large contributions to our **Endowment Fund**, bringing the total in that fund to \$150,000. That is a great start, and for the first time we'll start to receive income from the Endowment this year. My own goal is that the Endowment would one day grow to be \$1,000,000. At that level, the income from the Endowment could make a substantial impact on the outreach we could do right here in our community, would support new ministries and initiatives and would provide sufficient funds to help to maintain our beautiful, historic, church, among other things.

We did have to spend quite a lot of money in 2013 for items that were critical. We had two sidewalks that were in disrepair and were unsafe. We spent more about \$25,000 to replace those sidewalks. The good news is that they are now replaced and will not require replacement again for decades to come, hopefully. Further, we had to replace our main heater in the sanctuary and parish office, which were both inefficient and, in the case of the office, unhealthy. We spent almost \$7,200 for those replacements and upgrades. As a result we currently only have about 1 month's were of expenses in our savings, or Management Reserves. I'd feel a lot better if we had 2-3 months there were of savings there. On a positive note, our spaces are much more safe, comfortable and efficient, perhaps than ever.

2014 will certainly be **a year of transitions**. I've mentioned some of them above. One that I must mention here is that we will be saying "goodbye" to our wonderful parish administrator, Chandra Boughton. Chandra's husband has been asked by his company to relocate to Tennessee, so Chandra and Chris, and their beloved canines (Carl and Dave) will be loading up the truck and moving to Nashville. This will take place around the first of April. We'll begin looking for a new Parish Administrator soon, so that Chandra and whoever we call can work together for a period and ensure a smooth transition. Chandra has been with us for more than six years, and has served two rectors and two interims, and helped us to smoothly come through all that change. Everyone who works with her remarks about how blessed we are to have her. We send her with our best wishes and love, confident that she will be a blessing whatever God leads her to do in Nashville.

In all, our parish is a thriving place where the Spirit of God can be experienced daily. I'm very grateful for you and this place. We continue to offer God's love through our worship and welcome. We continue to be a home for many, who come here seeking healing and salvation. I'm excited to see what God has in store for us in this new year.

Buildings and Grounds

The past year has been one of intensive work on our buildings and grounds. The property inspection report completed in February caused us to develop a plan for addressing issues raised in the report.

The plan was a three-part approach prioritizing the needs of our buildings and grounds:



1. Health and safety issues were identified in the report and we gave them our highest priority. We replaced defective furnaces and serviced our air conditioners. The unsafe historic sidewalks on Calle Puente and Avenida Aragon were replaced per city regulations. Other electrical, plumbing, roof, and vermin issues were also corrected.

2. We then focused on routine repairs and replacements such as paint, woodwork, lighting, the purging of excess stored items, landscape irrigation, and redecorating of the Bride's Room.

3. Routine maintenance was performed per our new schedules. Those schedules provide for regular attention to details that will avoid deferred maintenance in the future.

Landscaping issues, such as the dangerous placement of the Hollywood Junipers adjacent to the sanctuary, led us to focus on broader landscaping concerns. A committee has been formed that will begin this month to discuss the future of our landscaping. We see this committee as a vehicle to explore existing issues and to develop plans for the future of our grounds. The completed product of the Landscaping Committee will be presented to the vestry and then to the parish for final action.

This group has also performed several service functions including running a game booth at the San Clemente Winter Carnival.

Father Patrick also leads a weekly Bible study group that meets on Wednesday mornings in the library. This group is open to anyone interested in a more in depth study of scripture.

Finance Report

2013 presented a number of financial challenges, which, in recent years, appear to be the norm rather than the exception. The slow financial recovery and continuing, related struggles of some of our families are part of our challenge and our opportunity at St. Clement's.

We completed the year with a \$3,600 surplus, after beginning it with a budgeted \$7,100 deficit. That is a wonderful swing in financial results which was driven by a number of unusual items.

From the revenue side, our pledge income exceeded our budget by over \$12,200. Also, our fund raising, largely driven by the tile program, generated a revenue of almost \$4,800 over budget. In addition, we received a donation which contributed to our significant endowment increase and also provided an additional \$22,000 in general funds.

The outstanding giving performance of our congregation more than offset the unbudgeted costs of our new assistant rector which were about \$26,600.

So we end 2013 with gratitude for the tithing/pledging/donating of our congregants which allow us to have achieved these results. That generosity has also allowed us to increase our endowment fund to over \$150,000, an asset which we expect to generate funding for our missions in years to come.

As is frequently the case, however, there is no "final victory." While pledges as of this date have increased by about \$25,000 over 2013, we have a number of potential expenditures we must find a way to deal with including a full year of the cost of an assistant rector. Also, due to the significant amount of capital expenditures we charged to our reserves in 2013, we must begin to rebuild those reserves to insure proper maintenance for our historic, holy home.

While we report here both positive and negative financial events during 2013, there is one wonderful trend that has continued....and that is the continuing support of our St. Clement's family.

Outreach

Deuteronomy 15:11

Therefore I command you, "You shall open wide your hand to your brother, to the needy and to the poor, in your land."

The Outreach ministry of St. Clement's is a true program of the entire church community.

Many St. Clement's parishioners are directly engaged in faith-based service: teaching and assisting the Peaceful Warrior program, volunteering at the iHOPE thrift store, providing

Christian education at St. Clement's, making sandwiches for the hungry. This is a loving and giving community, and the list of contributions is long.

Through your pledges to the church, St. Clement's contributed more than <u>\$40,000</u> in 2013 as our "Mission Share" to the Los Angeles Diocese, which distributes funds to worldwide mission activity.

The St. Clement's Vestry allocates an additional \$10,000 a year directly from the church. We have chosen to provide those funds to local faith-based nonprofit ministries.

- Welcome Inn food for the homeless: More than 750 nutritious sack meals were prepared by the three service congregations of St. Clement's and distributed to the homeless in Capistrano Beach as part of the ecumenical Welcome Inn program, which was started 26 years ago. Parishioners work together to pack the lunches on the third Sunday of every month in Okie Hall, rotating among the three services. The St. Clement's Outreach budget funds the purchase of food for this program. http://www.welcomeinnoc.com/ about.htm
- Family Assistance Ministries (FAM) is providing food, shelter, and client aid to thousands of people in South Orange County, as well as collaborating with other social services organizations to provide referrals and medical screenings, immunizations, eye glasses, and more. FAM receives \$200 a month from the St. Clement's Outreach budget. Rite 13 youth and adults participated in the 26th annual Hunger Walk in October. St. Clement's parishioners also contributed toys, children's clothing, and gift cards to the Christmas collection for youth. http://www.family-assistance.org/
- Mary Erickson Community Housing promotes the well-being of working families in Southern California by increasing and preserving the supply of affordable housing. MECH established the first affordable housing complex in San Clemente and has since grown to include multiple properties and developments serving hundreds of families in Southern California. St. Clement's is a sponsor of the annual fundraise Sunset at Salt Creek, which many parishioners attend. St. Clement's pledges \$200/month to this organization. www.maryerickson.org
- **iHOPE** is a faith-based organization serving the homeless and poor in south orange county. They provide showers, laundry facilities, internet access, bus passes, and counseling to the needy, with a goal of helping people find employment. They have had some wonderful successes in getting people back on their feet and in the workforce, and are also challenged by many homeless people who have significant problems and great need. St. Clement's pledges \$200/month to this organization. www.ihopeoc.org

In January, 2013 St. Clements hosted Father William Beers from Food for the Poor, which is the largest international relief and development organization in the U.S. It annually feeds millions of hungry people in the Caribbean and Latin America. Parishioners donated more than \$1,000 to this charity as a result of the visit. http:// www.foodforthepoor.org/

The remaining 20 years were spent working in private Industry (the last 17 years as Health Physics Manager at the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station).

After retirement I became bored, and spent some time in volunteer work as an ombudsman visiting residential care facilities for the elderly. I also joined the South Coast Literacy Council (another voluntary organization) and for the last 9 years I have taught English to Non-English speakers on Friday nights at Saint Clements, as San Clemente Center Director (an overblown title as the classes are very small).

I also do private consulting in Radiation Protection and spend 10 or 12 hours per week doing private tutoring in Math and Science. From time to time I also work for the Orange County Department of Education in the Alternative Education Program (ACCESS).

It might be of some interest to know that my father was an Episcopal Minister and that I spent my 7th and 8th years living at a Harry-Potter-like school (for the 50 boys who made up the soprano section) at the Cathedral of Saint John the Devine in New York City.

I have been a member of Saint Clement's congregation for about 9 years. Although I like the Eight O'clock Service because there is a minimum of interests and activities which interfere with interaction with God, I hope to contribute to the health and growth of the organization (my neighbors).
