

Ministries...

It has been a busy time around our beloved St. Clement's. I guess it is in many parishes as we gear up again for the Fall, and the return of kids to school, and – we pray – the safe return of all our parishioners from their various travels and adventures. This year, seems especially so, because we have made some substantial changes to our Peaceful Warrior Tae Kwon Do program. We are still in the midst of some of those changes, and we have some encouraging signs that we are heading in the right direction.



As you may know, Peaceful Warrior was founded by our beloved Earl "Duke" Welliver in September 2005. That effort was supported by the then rector, now Bishop, Diane Bruce, and with a grant from Kiwani's, which was secured by our late parishioner, Miki Cumming. Duke's incredible dedication to this program cannot be overstated. Until his retirement in 2015, Duke was here almost every weekday to teach Tae Kwon Do and to lead this ministry for our parish and community.

Duke's vision, as I understood it, was to create a program for "at risk" youth. Peaceful Warrior was primarily, a low-cost, after-school ministry. This program put the benefits of a Martial Arts education within the reach of many kids for whom commercial programs were simply too costly. For many years, the tuition for this program was just \$10/mo., and Duke never turned a student away, who couldn't pay. Of course, that tuition could be that low, because Duke was also doing all these things without compensation.

Needless to say, I was impressed with Duke and what he was doing since even before I became the Rector. Later, when I heard the stories from these young people about how transformative this ministry had been in their lives, I was even more inspired. You'll recall, not that long ago, when these students achieved their black belt, Duke would have them come into the worship and thank the congregation for us having this program, and we got to share a little bit of their joy at their amazing accomplishment.

In the three years since Duke's retirement, my perception is that these two organizations, the parish and Peaceful Warrior, have drifted a bit apart. We've not had the black belts coming into the worship as in the past, for example. And because none of the regular instructors is a parishioner here, perhaps that little bit of distance between was to be expected.

But, Peaceful Warrior remains a vital ministry of this parish, and I've taken some deliberate steps recently to reconnect us. We are returning to Duke's vision for this ministry, as an after-school program for at-risk and low-income youth. While the program is open to any young person, this was the purpose for which it was created, and it is a vision in which we believe. This program deeply connects us to our community and meets a real need. That need is especially prevalent in the youth that live right around our parish.

We'll soon have a parents' night for the parents of our Peaceful Warrior children. At that session, we'll share our vision of the values we hope to inspire in these youngsters, like "courtesy, integrity, perseverance, self-control and an indomitable spirit." Again, Duke's vision! We'll make some realities about this ministry clear. Like the fact that the only reason we can offer a high-quality martial arts program for only \$30/month is because St. Clement's provides space for this ministry, rent-free, and supports the program administratively.

In order for us to continue to be able to offer such a program, we need the volunteerism and participation of parents (who have a vested interest in our continued success) and from parishioners. Commercial programs pay people to do much of what is necessary for a program like this to function. But, they also must charge tuition that is several times higher than our tuition. We charge very little, but we also need the support (from volunteers) that makes any program or ministry function well.

We are, in some respects, presently re-building this program. We've brought on an additional instructor and once again offer classes immediately after school lets out at Las Palmas. And, I'm pleased to say new students are registering. As an important step in reconnecting ministry and parish, one of our clergy will be opening belt tests with prayer, and those students who achieve black belt will be returning to thank the congregation for making this ministry possible.

In addition to the ways we support this ministry noted above, we also provide "scholarships" which we make possible for students who cannot afford even our very low tuition (again preserving that tradition that Duke started of not turning any student away). You can help us! If you have expertise in grant-writing for example, financial management, or leadership development, we could certainly use your expertise. If you are comfortable with spreadsheets or have skill with developing an on-line presence or marketing, we could use your assistance. And, if you'd like to make it possible, through scholarship, for a young person to participate in this program, you can also make a donation to Peaceful Warrior.

- Ruby's Diner Fundraiser Recap -

On July 11th, 2018, eleven of us met at our local Ruby's Diner at the Outlets at San Clemente to have breakfast in the TiKi Room. We were the first ones to take advantage of the fundraiser to support our church, St. Clement's by-the-Sea. Throughout the day, many more parishioners and friends participated in our fundraising event. Father Patrick noted that at the time he was there to enjoy a meal, it seemed half of those dining were members of our congregation! Enjoying a meal with friends was a wonderful way to connect with church members while creating income

to support St. Clement's. Ruby's Diner graciously shared 20% of the proceeds, which amounted to over \$238.00. Thank you all for coming out and supporting our good cause!

- World Trekker: Russell Kerr Conquers Mr. Everest Base Camp -

Russell Kerr, who attends St. Clement's with his wife Pamela, recently shared with parishioners his amazing, inspiring adventure climbing to Mt. Everest Base Camp.

Russ, a native of New Zealand and life-long "trekker", spent 17 days in Nepal in May climbing to and from Mt. Everest Base Camp, with an elevation of more than 17,000 feet.

Russ's brother-in-law, a physician who volunteered for 6 months at Sir Edmund Hillary's hospital in Kunde, which is on the route to



Base Camp, along with Russ' sister, invited Russ to join the trip. He agreed, and said that after a lifetime spent hiking at high elevations there was not too much extra training required.

The trek was 10 days up and 7 days back. The 26 New Zealand trekkers each carried 20 pound backpacks, while the Sherpa porters carried 60 pound packs. Russ said that 20,000 people a year travel to Base Camp, and 3,000 attempt to scale the Everest peak itself, which is 29,029 feet.

His presentation featured jaw-dropping photos of spectacular mountain beauty. Russ said that the beauty and stillness of trekking in the steep valleys and being in sight of the highest mountains in the world was profound. He was also impressed by the simple Sherpa life in the villages along the Everest trail, with no mechanization or vehicles because "everything is either going up or going down", so there is no place where wheels can be used.

Thank you, Russ, for sharing your adventure with us.






Followed by a luncheon celebration in Okie Hall 12:00pm Spanish service will be held as scheduled.

Back-to-School Preparation: Not Just About the School Supplies -

Use This Time to Revisit The Parts of Your Estate Plan That Impact Your Children Most

With all the considerations about your children's wellbeing weighing on your mind from day to day, it can be easy to forget about some of the most important factors in keeping them well cared for and secure: naming a guardian in your estate plan.

- Review and refresh intent letters: If you've used intent letters in your estate plan to provide additional meaning and context to your guardianship designations and other estate planning documents, it's a great time to make sure those are reflective of your current goals and wishes, as well.
- Review and refresh your estate plan: It's always a good idea to keep your estate plan as up to date as
 possible. The addition of a new child to your family by birth or adoption may mean your plan requires
 substantial changes. This is also the case if one of your children has turned 18. If either of these events
 occurred since our last assessment of your plan, it is imperative that you don't wait to make any
 necessary alterations to your plan.
- Review college savings plans and strategies: Do you have a child who is preparing to attend college in
 the coming years? We can explore various planning strategies to help financially plan for the cost of
 tuition and help your family make strategic choices about higher education planning. It's never too early
 to begin researching scholarship opportunities if you have a child already in high school. There are also
 a variety of accounts, such as 529s, UTMA/UGMA, ESAs, and HEETs that can be used to reduce the
 financial toll of tuition.

Back-to-school time means a flurry of activity for most parents. While shopping for supplies and attending school functions may dominate your to-do list, remember to set up an appointment with us to review your estate plan for any necessary updates that could impact your children's wellbeing. Columbarium Pre-Construction Pricing Deadline: September 30th

The proposed columbarium, which is a structure in the church Memorial Garden for the inurnment of sacred remains, has been well received by St. Clement's parishioners. We have already exceeded the required minimum number of 25 sales set by the Vestry earlier this year.

Niche selection is first-come first-served

While there are plenty of niches in the columbarium, because it is designed to serve the needs of St. Clement's for a long time, people do have preferences of niche location. The eye-level niches and along each end seem to be the most popular. The sooner you purchase your niche (which holds two urns) the more niche choices you will have. It is also helpful in the church planning process to know the number of initial participants.

You can select and purchase a niche at the church office from Alicia during office hours, 8:00am-1:00pm, Tuesday through Friday. Payment by credit card can be done in the church office.


The gala is on Saturday, October 20th, from 5:00pm to 9:00pm. Tickets are \$65/each, and include:

Our Navajo/Diné guide, Don Mose, keeps the car moving forward at a fast pace as Janice and Erik and I bounce up and down in our seats and frantically lurch left and right. Erik is laughing up a storm.

The road into remote Mystery Valley is crisscrossed with side roads and desert washes. If it were me navigating we would be lost in minutes, but Don Mose knows what he's doing and nonchalantly keeps up the conversation as we bounce along.

I first greeted Don in Monument Valley, Utah, north of Mystery Valley, at the meeting place for Navajo Spirit Tours. A Diné guide is required in order to enter the restricted area into Mystery Valley. "Ya'at'eeh abini," good morning!

"Very good. Yes, good morning!"

--Which started him into a story about his many years teaching the Navajo/Diné language at Monument Valley High School. "You know, our language is the second-most difficult language to learn, next to Chinese. It is difficult teaching the young people, as you can't get them away from their cell phones."

"At Goulding's Trading Post this morning I said 'Ahéhee', Thank you," I replied. "The lady corrected my pronunciation, telling me that what I had actually said was, "I am married!" At least this was not as bad as some of the mispronunciations I made when I first celebrated mass in Spanish. At the time of communion, instead of saying "Los Dones de Dios para el Pueblo de Dios –The Gifts of God for the People of God," I said "Las Donas de Dios –The Donuts of God..."

Nevertheless, my attempt at the Diné language was reaching out to Don Mose, and I could see that we had made a connection.

A faint trail on the right brings the vehicle through dense juniper and pinyon pine and what looks like the end of the road: a steep granite shelf jutted upward before us. "Time to engage first gear, four-wheel drive," announces Don Mose. "I hope this works. I wouldn't dare do this in my own car!" And remarkably, the weather-beaten Ford slowly ascends the rocky face, our guide expertly navigating the fissures and crannies to a level place high above. He stops the car and tells us it is safe to step outside.

In the distance is the iconic landscape of Monument Valley which is called in Diné, Tsé Bii' Ndzisgaii, The Valley of the Rocks. Sandstone buttes erupt here and there. In my mind I see John Wayne riding atop a stagecoach here –John Ford's *Stagecoach* of 1939 was the actor's breakout movie. Monument Valley is the main player in a dozen iconic Westerns. Here, nothing seems too long ago, the past is present. In fact, the Navajo Tribal Park has its own time zone. The ruins of villages and the rock art remind us of the ancient people who once lived here, and bring them to the present.
